# Notes from the President

It's been almost two years since the Darnestown Civic Association took the first steps towards tackling the deer overpopulation in our area, and I think we've made some great progress. Beginning last fall, two sections of Great Seneca Park bordering Darnestown were opened up to bow hunting during the fall season, September 15 through January 31.

According to the DNR's database "approximately 200 deer were taken by archery hunters on these two hunting areas. There have been no reported instances of negative encounters between archery hunters and other recreational users on the area. Neither were there any reported incidents of trespassing by archery hunters onto adjacent private property." DNR has proposed extending the, hunting area for this upcoming fall to include the area of the Park south of Rt. 28 to the existing hunting area along Berryville Road.

# Village Committee Update

The Village Committee is concerned with all matters relating to the commercial and residential properties around the main Darnestown intersection of Darnestown and Seneca Roads, i.e. the town center. (See map) Primarily, our concerns have been with the commercial development in the Village, but the committee is always cognizant of protecting the well being of the nearby residential neighbors.

The impetus for the formation of the Village Committee occurred during one of Montgomery County's hyper-development periods. That period occurred in the mid-late 1980s. During 1985-87 the existing older houses in the Darnestown village area were reviewed by the Montgomery County Historic Preservation Commission to determine if any of these houses or sites would be designated Historic. Some local history enthusiasts were very disappointed when none of the houses or sites received Historic Designation by the Commission.

For two years, starting in 1986, real estate developer, Nathan Landow, bought almost all the properties in the village on the north side of Darnestown Road except the last two or three houses adjacent to the local park. This included 4.4 acres of C-1 property and 13 acres of residential R-200 (1/2 acre) property on both sides of the commercially zoned area. On the Mann parcels on the south side of Rt. 28 around and behind the gas station, were at least two older houses. Two of those houses and one of Landow's recent acquisitions, the Ace Esworthy place, were bulldozed in a surprise move without demolition At the time it was discovered that permits. demolishing a house without a permit had little consequence. Also, the five or six other houses purchased by Landow were vacated and boarded up; the uncut vegetation soon engulfed the properties. Only the Veterinary Clinic stayed open.

So, during this tumultuous time, it appeared that at least two large property owners in the heart of Darnestown were intent on major changes on their properties. These presumed changes were clearly at odds with the 1980 Potomac Sub-Region Master Plan. Mr. Landow publicly proposed a commercial strip center on his roughly 18 acres of property. The first stage was to be 100,000 sq. ft., and anchored by a Giant Food store. The second phase to come sometime in the future would be as much as an additional 100,000 sq. ft. Some of us thought 'What is he thinking?'

The Greater Darnestown Civic Association, the passionate members of the GDCA Historic Preservation committee (later to become the Darnestown Historical Society) and the vast majority of the community were in favor of upholding the Master Plan. This view prevailed and houses to the east and west of the agreed upon 1980 Master Plan 4.4-acre commercial area (now the Harris Teeter site) is the result. The expanded store will be the maximum allowable size at about 43,000 square feet.

In the spring and summer of 1988 the Darnestown Village Committee was formed. Their mission was and is to help influence development in the Village area. The initial presiding member was Steve Ellis of Ancient Oak. After consulting with past GDCA presidents, Marsha Crowley, Bob and Ann Cangelosi, and others members of the community the original Village Committee members included: John Brocard, Peter Carstensen, Jim Clifford, Frank Cornelius, Bob Fazio, Gerry Foley, Lit Foley, Rick Griffin, Jim Locke, Lad Masi, Linda Oxley, Nick Petruccelli, Dennis and Priscilla Rippeon and Sylvia Trunnel. From 1990 to 2001 Dennis Rippeon was our Chairman. During that time the DCA and David Landow, son of Nathan, slowly established a good working relationship. The Landows were informed that there were bodies buried on the Ace Bruce Deppa, Dennis, and Esworthy property. Historical Society members made the effort to determine the existence and proximate location of the burial sites. Rather than deal with this area, the Landows gifted the .75-acre site to Park and Planning (and thus our community) during the development process for the Food Lion. This area will eventually become an interesting Historical Park adjacent to the Harris Teeter.

Terry Reis succeeded Dennis. Terry and I began sharing the role a couple of years ago. Terry especially helped make sure that the new grocery store would be as unobtrusive as possible for the surrounding neighbors. The current Village Committee has about 10 members. They are chosen or invited by the Chairperson and should be willing to meet and do some work. If you are interested, we'll give you an opportunity. In the next issue the current members will be named.

The Village Committee, as all committees of the DCA, serves as a part of the Executive Board and the community at large. The elected Executive Board Officers have ultimate approval authority over the recommendations and pursuits of the committee.

# Wildlife Committee

#### Managed Deer Hunt Update

Introduction: The Wildlife Committee's main concern in the last year has been implementing the Darnestown Deer Management Plan of 17 December 2004. To that end the following issues under Progress Report have been accomplished or completed. There is still much to do before the deer population comes into balance and the woodlands and forest begin to recover but we are making some headway. I would like to formalize the Wildlife Committee a little more by having some meetings to advance our progress, more at the end on this topic.

#### **Progress Report:**

1. DNR reports; Seneca Creek State Park Area 1 & 2 were open to archery deer hunting on October 15, 2005 through January 31, 2006, under a Managed Hunting Program. Rules and Conditions were established for archery hunters to follow on these two areas. As a special condition properly licensed hunters were required to obtain a free annual permit to hunt deer on this tract and to have the permit in their possession while hunting.

Overall the Managed Hunting Program on Seneca Hunting Area 1& 2 proved to be a success. According to our recording database there were approximately 200 deer that were taken by archery hunters on these two hunting areas. There were no reported instances of negative encounters between archery hunters and other recreational users on the area. Neither were there any reported

incidents of trespass by archery hunters onto adjacent private property.

#### 2. Letter from Ken D'Loughy

I wanted to let you know that I am in the process of mailing you several informational items, for the Darnestown Community Association, that pertain to Seneca Creek State Park (SCSP) Hunting Areas 1&2. I am sending you a brief summary of the results of last season's archery hunting activity on SCSP Hunting Areas 1&2 and some administrative changes. Additionally I am enclosing a hunting plan proposal for expansion of archery hunting on SCSP Hunting Area 2, north to MD Route 28. I would appreciate any comments the Darnestown Community Association may have on that expansion proposal. I am also providing you with a copy of a deer hunting plan proposal for the Schaeffer Farm Tract of Seneca Creek State Park. A copy of this proposal is being sent to residents like yourself living adjacent to or in close proximity to the Schaeffer Farm Tract. Once again vour comments are welcome on this proposal. Please contact me (or Walt Brown) if you have any specific questions or comments on the proposals. We look forward to working with you and the Darnestown Community Association on deer management issues.

3. Sunday Hunting Bill MC 602-06 Passed-This bill was difficult to get passed but we had a good turnout and help from the Agricultural Community to support us. It is only TWO Sundays but we think it will be significant because most deer hunters only get out on Saturdays and this will give more time in the woods for them. Again it ONLY applies to private property.

#### The bill says:

"Provided that the provisions of § 10-415 of this title are met and subject to paragraph (4) of this subsection, the Department may allow a person to hunt deer on private property on the first Sunday of:

(i) The bow hunting season in November; and (ii) The deer firearms season."

Demonstration Project: At the April Darnestown Executive Board Meeting the idea came up about a demonstration plot someplace in Darnestown. The idea would be to show the effects of over browsing/ destruction of the undergrowth of a selected parcel of forest. Adjacent to this marked plot we would place a fenced in protected plot that would exclude the deer. The plants, bushes, wild flowers and small mammals and birds would be allowed to rejuvenate without any deer intervention. A similar project was done in Pennsylvania with dramatic results. If we approach this from a scientific basis and get DNR, Forestry Service, and the State Biologist etc. involved I believe we could draw some conclusions that will help in our campaign to restore the balance of nature. For example, How long before the woods grow back to normal? How long before the undergrowth and natural bushes comes back?

Please send me your input by email.

The Purpose: The Wildlife Committee was formed to manage the human-wildlife conflict through identification of problems, exploration of evidenced based solutions, partnering with other private and governmental organizations, engaging state and local government in implementing solutions, and the formation of action plans. The purpose is to decrease human-wildlife conflict and help restore the balance of a natural environment of the land, streams and forest around the Darnestown area.

If you would like to participate, please send me an email. Thanks to those of you who participated in both the feed back for deer management plan and other activities. I will coordinate a meeting for June so we can discuss the next steps

Some facts about ovarian cancer:

- Ovarian cancer is the fourth leading cause of cancer death among women in the United States.
- Ovarian cancer kills more women than all the Gynecologic Oncology combined.
- Ovarian cancer occurs in 1 in 57 women.

- More than 16,000 women will die this year alone and more than 25,500 will be diagnosed.
- Annually, in the Greater Washington D.C. area (including MD, VA and D.C.) an estimated 2,000 women will learn they have ovarian cancer and about 600 women will die from ovarian cancer.
- Ovarian cancer is very treatable when caught early; the vast majority of cases are not diagnosed until too late. When ovarian cancer is caught before it has spread outside the ovaries, 90+% will survive 5 years.

# Darnestown's Greg Clemmer Wins History Book Award

This book prize is named for the late Dr. Douglas Southall Freeman, noted editor of the Richmond Times-Dispatch and double winner of the Pulitzer Prize for his biographies of Robert E. Lee and George Washington.

The Freeman History Award recognizes the work of highest merit in the field of Southern history with coverage from the colonial period to the present. The prize is a cash award of \$1000 and an inscribed plaque.

Clemmer joins such other notable authors as Virginius Dabney (*The Last Review*, 1985) and Dr. James I. Robertson, Jr. (*Stonewall Jackson: The Man, The Soldier, The Legend*, 1997).

Gregg is best known locally for his annual contribution to Darnestown History Day. For nearly 20 years, he's regaled the fourth graders of Darnestown Elementary School with stories and artifacts of their local civil war heritage.

# Darne Bloomers Garden Club

#### Deer, Deal With It

Well, it's that time of year when gardeners are optimistic with thoughts of lush flowering gardens and bountiful crops. Then a quick inventory of your landscape reminds you that your garden is the buffet line for our local deer population.

According to the Maryland Cooperative Extension Handbook deer are selective feeders. "They forage on plants with considerable discrimination. Landscaping based on a knowledge of deer feeding preferences can provide an alternative to the use of expensive repellents and unsightly physical barriers." It goes on to say that deer are creatures of habit and prior movement patterns or foraging experience can foretell where the danger will occur. Deer are known to feed selectively on fertilized plants. New plantings added to an existing landscape already severely damaged by deer will likely suffer from some browsing. No plant species will be avoided under all conditions.

With that said don't despair, you can cohabitate successfully if you follow these simple steps:

First get rid of plants that deer consider a staple in their diets. Trees and shrubs like azaleas, hydrangeas, euonymous, yew, arborvitea, some hollys, and roses.

Perennials/annuals: hosters, impatiens, tulips, phlox, and ivy. You'll know which ones that are in your yard... they are the ones that are eaten down to the nubs.

I know this seems harsh, but in order to break their routine this step is necessary. Then start planting varieties that they are less likely to be attracted to, such as:

Barberry, boxwood, spruce, Japanese Pieris, Leucothoe, American and Chinese Holly, dogwood, English hawthorn, honey locust, laurels, junipers, inkberry pines, flowering cherry, willows, lilac and wisteria, maples, serviceberry, flowering quince, smokebush, cotoneaster, cedar, witch hazel, and rose of sharon, spirea, and nandia; and anything else in your yard that they are not currently eating.

Perennials/annuals and bulbs like: daffodils, hyacinth, iris, coreopsis, lambs ear, pacasandra, vinca, salvia, bleeding heart, astilbe, fox glove, artemesia, catmint, yarrow, and ornamental grasses.

You may have to continue to use deer repellants for a season or two until their pattern is fully broken, remember to reapply after every rain. In the long run it will be worth it and your garden will be blooming with success. Then on occasion stop gazing at your beautiful garden and wave to the deer in your neighbors yard.



# Seneca Academy And The Circle School by Jodi Thurmond

The school auction, "Starry Nights", was a tremendous success and funds raised by our parents were used to purchase additional playground equipment. The new equipment will be used in Seneca's physical education curriculum for upper body strengthening and to improve students' agility. As a special party favor, each attendee of the auction received a photo of their child affixed to a shiny star.

Progress in the Schoolyard Habitat has been rapid with the advent of warmer weather. A dry streambed and stone steps were completed and older students planted appropriate groundcover and native, deer resistant plants in the area. Students have been amazed to observe the reemergence of water lilies, frogs and fish in the wildlife pond and the water has been teeming with tadpoles as well. New trees have been planted in the vicinity to provide additional homes for birds. Students of all ages are utilizing the habitat as a learning laboratory in many curricular areas while the intermediate

students are charged with habitat maintenance as suggested by the National Wildlife Federation's guidelines for Schoolyard Habitats.

Also, the intermediate students in Grades 5-8 recently participated in a lock-in. The overnight at the school included assembling "hobo" dinners and cooking them in the fire pit, observing wildlife at night, playing flashlight tag, exuberant dancing and enjoying games in the Gathering Room.

Many students in the school have been participating in a "virtual" walk to the Quince Orchard Library as part of the Seneca Walking Club. This club was initiated to encourage students to improve their physical fitness and an indoor trail was established to provide students with a measured walk. An outdoor trail can be utilized in appropriate weather.

Preschool classes have been busy as well. Art created in the nursery classrooms was displayed with art pieces created by the older students at the annual Music and Art Show in April. Several preschool classes also traveled to Homestead Farm for strawberry picking with their classmates and parents.

A highlight of spring was the visit of Kevin Reese, Resident Artist, who worked with students throughout our school to create a unique art piece for installation in front of our building. The design and fabrication of the mobile integrated the subject areas of art, mathematics and physics. We were thrilled to be a part of the nationwide program, "School Sculpture".

Another highlight was the visit of The Dennis Walters Golf Show. This inspirational show highlighted the resilience of the human spirit and was sponsored for Seneca by TPC Avenel as part of their community outreach program.

Camp Seneca will begin in June for children ages 4-8 and this year will feature the theme, Passport to the World. Older students aged 8-10 may register for Seneca Art Camp. Both camps are open to any interested children in the community.

#### Are You a New Resident of Darnestown?

If you are a new resident of Damestown, welcome to our neighborhood! The information on this page should be helpful and will introduce you to some things that give Damestown a sense of community.

The Damestown Civic Association, Inc. is a nonprofit corporation originally formed in 1967, which represents the interests of Damestown area residents in all matters pertaining to the welfare of Damestown and its residents. The general purposes of the DCA are explained in its bylaws and Articles of Incorporation. Payment of annual dues (\$25 per individual or family) enables you to vote on issues during Town Meetings.

The fiscal year of the DCA is July 1 through June 30, and annual dues billing statements are mailed out at the end of June each year, although dues may be paid any time during a given year. Current officers of the DCA are listed in *The Little Acorn*.

**Boundaries:** Since Damestown is not incorporated, it has no official boundaries. The activities and focus of the DCA include an area of some 12 square miles, centered approximately at the intersection of Maryland Routes 28 and 112 (Damestown Road and Seneca Road). Maps are available at Town Meetings.

The Little Acorn newsletter is published quarterly, in March, June, September and December. Its name derives from its origin as a tiny newsletter in the Ancient Oak subdivision more than 20 years ago. Now it is mailed (3rd class) to every residential address that we have in our DCA data base. This name and address file is maintained by volunteers, based on information from our block captains, from our annual billing statement returns and from any information that we receive from the neighborhoods. The newsletter should arrive in your mailbox early in each of the above months. If you don't receive an issue, please contact the editors or any DCA officer. Publication of The Little Acorn is entirely a volunteer effort except for the printing and mailing.

Town Meetings are held quarterly by the DCA, usually on the 2nd or 3rd Thursday of March, June, September and December in the Fellowship Hall of the Darnestown Presbyterian Church at the intersection of Route 28 and Turkey Foot Road. Meetings are scheduled for 7:30 p.m., but are not called to order until 7:45 to allow some time for meeting neighbors, etc. Each issue of The Little Acorn features an announcement about the upcoming Town Meeting.

Annual Meeting and Election of DCA Officers coincide with the Town Meeting in June. Nominations are announced in *The Little Acorn* in advance of the Annual Meeting in accordance with the bylaws of the GDCA.

Telephone Directory: Every two years, the DCA publishes a directory of residents' names, addresses and phone numbers and mails it to every residential address in our database. To obtain a copy of the Directory, call Marsha Crowley at 301-840-9428. They are only available while supplies last.
