Notes from the President

We are staying ever vigilant on the reliability of our utility companies, specifically, Pepco. One of our board members, Art Slesinger, has kindly volunteered to be on a special Pepco task force set up by County Executive Ike Leggett. They've only met a few times, but I'm sure Art's polite persistence will get them on the right track to make sure Pepco is doing the right things to improve the quality of our service. I don't know about you, but I'm fed up with power outages.

Our last Town Meeting in September had the MNCPPC crew discuss the latest developments with our Heritage Park, next to Harris Teeter. We were blown away, some of us in tears, over how spectacular this park is going to be. The artist, Cheryl Foster, will be creating six sculptures: William Darne, Native American, Civil War soldier, grain miller, tobacco picker, teacher; and how they are a part of Darnestown's History. Project Manager Heidi Sussman hopes that the park will bring not only local residents, but school buses and people from other areas to learn about our heritage. Construction of the park may begin as early as next spring. Our next Town Meeting is scheduled for Thursday, December 9, 7:30 pm at the Fellowship Hall of the Darnestown Presbyterian Church located on the corner of Turkey Foot and Darnestown (Rt. 28) Roads. We will have two guests: Luther Reynolds, 5th District Police Commander, and a representative from the 1st District talking about recent crime and what they are doing to prevent a recurrence. Utility Reliability

The County Executive's committee examining PEPCO will have met 4 or 5 times by the time you read this article. The writer was appointed to the committee by Mr. Leggett to represent civic associations. The Committee of 12 volunteer members hopes to complete its examination of PEPCO service and reliability by January of 2011 and issue a series of recommendations to Ike Leggett.

This is ambitious, as the Maryland PSC is undertaking a similar examination and has required PEPCO to hire and pay for an independent consultant. This latter effort will be completed mid 2011. In many ways, both efforts will be looking at the same data. There is a great deal of work to be done, and the two examinations may not reach the same conclusions.

PEPCO President Tom Graham has promised to tour our community with this writer; hopefully he will find time in his hectic schedule to honor the commitment. The bottom line is clear and not contested; nationally PEPCO service is in the bottom quartile based on reliability but not so in price. How and if the Public Service Commission will resolve this inequity remains to be seen.

In the meantime, what the writer has learned that you must know is as follows. Until smart meters are installed ~2013, you must call into PEPCO's system to report outages. When there are widespread outages, there is the possibility that your house will experience a primary and secondary outage during the same event. This occurs when a major interruption occurs in your feeder as well as a second, smaller break closer to your home. PEPCO cannot see both causes. They repower the feeder at the major break, but until calls are again received from further down the feeder, they do not know power was NOT fully restored along the entire circuit. If you note

others near you getting their power but you are still in the dark, call again please: 877-737-2662.

It is with great sadness that I must report that Bruce Coyle of Verizon has been reassigned to another responsibility. During the last 6 months Bruce has been diligently and effectively repairing the Verizon phone line system in Darnestown. We expressed to his management our sincere thanks to the only person we found in Verizon who gets the job done. Bruce is truly a saint and a great man with whom to do business. Hopefully his replacement, Russ Chandler, can fill the large shoes of his predecessor.

Zoning Committee Update on Land Developments by Pam DuBois

The Darnestown Civic Association Zoning Committee has been monitoring several area land developments through the site plan approval process, some dating back to application submissions in 2002. An update of five of the more prominent parcels is summarized below.

1. Cornelius Property at 13710 Esworthy Road. This property comprises 35.65 acres with RC (rural cluster) zoning. It is currently improved with a single family home and a barn / shed with cattle grazing in the pastures. The property was subdivided into seven lots approximating five acres each (allowable given the RC zoning). Lot 1 (improved with the existing house and barn) and the adjacent Lot 2 were bequeathed to Frank Cornelius by his mother. Frank, who lives next door, purchased Lots 3 and 4 from the family's estate. The Maryland National Park and Planning Commission purchased the remaining three lots, approximately 16.5 acres for \$1.35 million, to augment the Blockhouse Point Conservation Park. If you enjoy the vista of rolling hills, cattle and



woodlands along this section of Esworthy Road, it looks like it is here to stay for quite some time.

- 2. Butz Property at 15330 Darnestown Road. This property comprises 258+ acres with RC zoning. It is located on the west side of Berryville Road along Darnestown Road. Subdivision plans were approved for 43 residential lots on approximately 94 acres with varied lot sizes that average slightly more than two acres a lot. Access to 39 planned homes will be directly across from Black Rock Road and there is a planned four home cul-de-sac across from Bellingham Drive. Elm Street Development is the developer and Winchester Homes is one of the Lots are also available to individuals builders. interested in building their own home. Infrastructure improvements along Darnestown Road have been completed and home sites are currently being marketed. Visit www.reserveatblackrock.com for more information.
- 3. Clubs Farm Property is located in the northwest corner of the intersection of Darnestown and Germantown Roads (Rts 28 and 118). Three homes were approved for the 19-acre site, infrastructure was put into place and the development is being marketed as Seneca Riding. The property is owned by the Magruder Companies, who reportedly has a contract pending to construct a home by their home building division, Black Rock Development. - Miller Property at 13635 Darnestown Road. Despite 4. the listed address, this property has no frontage along Darnestown Road. It is situated eastward behind the Paddocks subdivision between the Turkey Foot and Indian Run cul-de-sacs (Seneca Highlands), the Seneca State Park and the Haddonfield common area along the Colonial Pipeline Easement. The 15.7 acre parcel is zoned RC. The site has approved septic percs and Preliminary Plan approval to subdivide into two home sites (5.4 and 2.4 acre lots) and an outparcel which is not developable at this time subject to future county review. The property is listed with Long and Foster.
- 5. Schooley Property at 13700 Darnestown Road (across from Masonwood Drive). The property was subdivided from a single 5.89 acre parcel into four residential lots for the construction of four one-family detached dwelling. The lot size average is 1.5 acres. Robert K. Wormald, Inc. is the developer and builder for the project, known as Bridlewood

Estates. Visit www.wormald.com for more information.

Darne Bloomers Garden Club

STINK BUGS....What are we going to do with them?

Those hard shelled creatures are flying everywhere. They are eating our plants, flowers, vegetables, fruits, and shrubs outside of our house. Not only do they do our gardens a lot of harm, but they hibernate in the structures of our houses for the winter months. They will work their way under siding, into soffits, around window and door frames, under roof shingles and into any crawl space or attic vent.

They will come inside your house on your clothes or as soon as a door is opened. Once inside a warm room, they will be active all winter. They are attracted to light and will find their way into homes when the porch and deck lights are on and doors are being opened and closed. Stink Bugs can live a few years. When outside, the odor they release enables them to avoid getting eaten by several species of birds and lizards.

There have been many articles in newspapers, magazines, and on the internet about how invasive they are and how to help get the infestation under control.

The usual reliable garden insect pesticides do not work for these bugs. The front wings of the resting adult Stink Bug are folded into a protective shield which effectively prevents garden sprays from penetrating and killing them. Our local garden center has an organic essential oils product that is supposed to help with outside plants. It's called Flower Pharm, and consists of Cinnamon Oil, Cotton Seed Oil, and Rosemary Oil.

One of the suggested ways to help keep them from entering your house is to vacuum them up. Here's what my husband came up with, and we have found it really has worked for us for our front porch, deck, and all entrances into our house.

- 1) Buy a small container of "moth crystals" and read the cautions on the label.
- 2) Use any vacuum cleaner, keeping in mind that even a small hand-held vacuum cleaner will hold a lot of stink bugs.
- 3) Empty the machine of any debris from prior use, and put in a new bag if the vacuum uses bags.
- 4) Attach an extension wand to the machine's hose so that you can reach easily.
- 5) Turn on the machine and simply vacuum up a small amount of moth crystals (about one teaspoon). The

trapped moth crystals will very slowly release paradichlorobenzene over time as they change from a solid state to a gaseous state in a process called sublimation.

- 6) Catch as many bugs as you have time for.
- 7) Since most modern vacuums have a flexible rubber or plastic seal or valve of some sort to keep vacuumed stuff in the bag or vacuum chamber, the bugs will be trapped in the bag or chamber with the moth crystals, and will be dead in a few hours.
- 8) It's not necessary to empty the machine after each collection, since the bugs will not release their stinkiness, and the moth crystals will stay active until they have completely sublimated. The vacuum cleaner should be stored some place where the faint smell of paradichlorobezene will not bother anyone. A garage, basement, or shed is ideal.
- 9) After the bug season has ended (or when they are hibernating) simply dispose of the vacuum cleaner contents as household trash.

We keep the little vacuum handy and go out often. I found the stink bugs hiding under the cushions on my porch and deck, and inside the grill covers. I did not bring my ferns and potted plants in the house this winter for fear the bugs may be hibernating in the soil. Happy vacuuming and good luck!!!

Outdoor Winter Plans

You can fertilize your lawn during the winter. Proper seeding and aerating the soil before winter is good, and grass seed should have a chance to germinate before any snowfall. As the winter's snow melts, it will water the new grass.

Don't forget to keep the leaves off the lawn. Most of them are too acidic and will damage the grass. Brown patches may occur on your lawn if leaves are not removed.

It's okay to mow your lawn in winter. Keeping the grass short will help the root system to grow for the spring.

Indoor Winter Plans

Those seasonal plants need special care for them to last longer. Poinsettias should be placed near a sunny window, away from cold drafts and in a room where the temperature is in the 70-75°F range. The soil should be kept uniformly moist.



If you are planting amaryllis bulbs, place them with one inch sticking out of the soil and two inches between the bulb and the rim of the pot. Water thoroughly once, place in a sunny window and do not water again until green leaves appear. Your beautiful flowers will appear in 6-7 weeks. Using thin green bamboo garden stakes will help support these tall plants.

The Darne Bloomers Garden Club October meeting was a field trip near Culpepper, Virginia to visit Fresh Tulips USA, the company behind the tulips we purchase at our neighborhood grocery stores. They are the largest hydroponic supplier on the east coast. The group also enjoyed a tour of Old House Vineyards nearby.

For the November meeting the members and guests enjoyed a presentation of Winter Landscaping. Other programs in the future will include Gardening with Native Plants, a field trip to Homestead Gardens in Davidsonville, MD, and a tour of Georgetown's Dunbarton Oaks.

Rockets, Rockets Everywhere!

Stroll down the halls of Mary of Nazareth School on any given day, and you will witness engaged children, actively learning. This nature center is on the Chesapeake Bay north of Baltimore. Students learned about the estuary, the properties of water, and human issues threatening the bay. They went out on a pontoon boat and took water samples and then studied the samples in a lab. After cooking their own dinner, they went on a full moon hike and then slept in the center. Back in the classroom, the students applied their new-found knowledge to real-world problems as they explored and implemented ways to conserve water.

If you are a new resident of Darnestown, welcome to our neighborhood! The information on this page should be helpful and will introduce you to some things that give Darnestown a sense of community.

The Darnestown Civic Association, Inc. is a nonprofit corporation originally formed in 1967, which represents the interests of Darnestown area residents in all matters pertaining to the welfare of Darnestown and its residents. The general purposes of the DCA are explained in its bylaws and Articles of Incorporation. Payment of annual dues (\$25 per individual or family) enables you to vote on issues during Town Meetings.

The membership year of the DCA is January 1 through December 31, and annual dues billing statements are mailed out at the end of December each year, although dues may be paid any time during a given year. Current officers of the DCA are listed on Page 2 of The Little Acorn.

Boundaries: Since Darnestown is not incorporated, it has no official boundaries. The activities and focus of the DCA include an area of some 12 square miles, centered approximately at the intersection of Maryland Routes 28 and 112 (Darnestown Road and Seneca Road). Maps are available at Town Meetings.

The Little Acorn newsletter is published quarterly, in March, June, September and December. Its name derives from its origin as a tiny newsletter in the Ancient Oak subdivision more than 20 years ago. Now it is mailed

(3rd class) to every residential address that we have in our DCA data base. Volunteers, based on information from membership remittance form and our Welcome Committee, maintain this name and address file. The newsletter should arrive in your mailbox early in each of the above months. If you don't receive an issue, please contact the editor or any DCA officer. Publication of The Little Acorn is entirely a volunteer effort except for the printing and mailing.

Town Meetings are held quarterly by the DCA, usually on the 2nd or 3rd Thursday of March, June, September and December in the Fellowship Hall of the Darnestown Presbyterian Church at the intersection of Route 28 and Turkey Foot Road. Meetings are scheduled for 7:30 p.m., but are not called to order until 7:45 to allow some time for meeting neighbors, etc. Each issue of The Little Acorn features an announcement about the upcoming Town Meeting.

Annual Meeting and Election of DCA Officers coincide with the Town Meeting in June. Nominations are announced in June edition of The Little Acorn in advance of the Annual Meeting in accordance with the bylaws of the GDCA.
