membership letter to the community. After the letter is written, the CS edits and works with the printer/mailer to completion. Please let us know if you are interested!

As most of you are aware, many concerned Darnestown citizens have contacted us about unauthorized tree cutting by Pepco's contractor, Asplundh. We were effective in helping save some trees but the devastation continues. Pepco is clearly focused on trees and the negative impact they have on our power supply, especially during storms. Many of us are concerned about the poor reliability that is unrelated to trees and storms. Did you know that our loss of power is more than twice the national average for frequency and duration? It is the Public Services Commission (PSC) that sets the rates and returns. All they need to do is put Pepco in the electric chair and get them to perform to national standards.

One of our other concerns has been an increase in crime. Dick Jurgena monitors this for the Board and alerts us to crimes that happen near and within our boundaries. Kevin Keegan, our Safety Chairman, assists us further when we want more detailed information. Some of our neighborhoods have joined the "Neighborhood Watch" program and have found the information very helpful. If you are interested in starting a program for your neighborhood, call 301-657-0119 or 240-876-1277. Many of us use or live near parks that are monitored by the Maryland-National Capital Park Police. They are responsible for protecting the resources, people and programs within their 35,000 acres of parkland. Much of this parkland is within our boundaries or borders Darnestown. They rely on park visitors and neighbors to assist them. If you witness any crimes or suspicious activity on park property, call their 24-hour hotline at 301-949-3010. If you are interested in their crime prevention initiative, "Parkwatch", call 301-962-1646.

Thank you for another successful membership year! The 2012 membership drive will start within the next few months. Be on the lookout for a letter in your mailbox. 

#### Seneca Forest Project

We had our first official meeting of the project committee on the 15th of June. The attendees were Lisa Patterson, Susan Allaway, Karen Hinrichsen, Bob Thompson, Art Slesinger, and James Wheeler. We edited the wording of the signs that will be located near each gate at the two sites. The sturdy 18x24 inch signs are composed of two metal sheets with plastic in between. To coordinate with the sign colors in the Seneca State Park, the signs are ivory print on a brown background. Brochures with more detailed information will be forthcoming, and placed in clear plastic waterproof boxes at the sites.



#### Monitoring

It was decided that each site should be monitored once a week, and after any major storms. Karen Hinrichsen, wildlife committee co-chair, has volunteered to coordinate monitoring of the Upland/pipeline site, and Scott Mostrom, environment committee chair, will coordinate monitoring the Creek Site. If you want to be included as a monitor, let me/them know. You may only have to do it once a month or less. Please keep the gates closed when you go inside the areas. Bob Thompson will photograph the Creek site every season to give us a record of the developments. Someone is needed to photographically record the Upland site 4 times a year.

#### **Invasive non-native plants**

This will be the major task for the foreseeable future. The Creek site is overwhelmed by numerous species of foreign invasives, Japanese Stiltgrass being prolific. The hot summer weather is not conducive the weeding in the woods; so, we will need to put in a big effort in the late summer and fall.

The upland/pipeline site has significant J. Stiltgrass patches, but not insurmountable. We picked the mile-aminute out in late June. Those were the only two invasives that we have noticed in the upland site. Herbicides are not allowed in the Park.

On a very hot Friday in mid June an invasive plant tour of both sites was given by Kerrie Kyde. Kerrie is a long time resident of Dickerson, and a Habitat Ecologist and Invasive Plant Specialist with the Maryland DNR. Her office is located in the Seneca State Park. Susan Allaway, Becky Handley, Karen Hinrichsen, Sarah Scherer & boys, James Wheeler, Fe Wlotzko and I enjoyed 2-3 hours of her knowledge. She also distributed some books on nonnative invasive plant species in the Mid-Atlantic area.

There is good anecdotal evidence that the growth of the native plants will control the non-native invasives to some extent. James Wheeler showed us pictures of a 10 year fenced wooded area on his property. The photos are on the wall at the DCA office, and they indicate significant growth of native plants not surviving outside the fence, and the J. Stiltgrass was unable to get much of a foot hold within the fence.

#### Tour

There will be a signup sheet at the September town meeting for a tour of the sites this fall. If you go on your own, please let us know of any damage to our fence.

## News from the Upcounty Citizens Advisory Board

Montgomery County police are investigating a robbery of a 7-Eleven in Germantown by more than two dozen people. Police say the so-called "flash mob robbery" happened around 1:45 a.m. Saturday, August 13, 2011. The group of about 24 people entered the store, stole snacks, drinks and other items and left after about one minute.

Statement by County Executive Ike Leggett About the "Flash Mob Incident" at the Germantown 7-Eleven, August 16, 2011:

...I want to make perfectly clear that the type of mobbased criminal activity, as represented by the recent flash mob incident at a 7-Eleven in Germantown, will not be tolerated in Montgomery County. Our Police Department is currently in the process of identifying participants captured by surveillance video and is working with the State's Attorney's Office to determine the appropriate charges for those offenders. The incident, that occurred at 1:47 a.m. Saturday August 13, 2011, serves to illustrate why my recently-proposed overnight curfew for juveniles under 18 years of age could enhance public safety throughout the County. But, criminal activity by flash mobs has occurred far beyond Montgomery County and has, in fact, become a national and international issue of concern. This incident is a wake-up call to law enforcement agencies, government leaders, and families. We must all work together to help prevent our voung people from making wrong choices that can potentially endanger them, specifically and the welfare of our communities, in general...

The Upcounty Citizens Advisory Board represents more than 300,000 residents in the Upcounty area, north of Shady Grove Road and including the communities of Boyds, Clarksburg, Damascus, Damestown, Derwood, Dickerson, Gaithersburg, Germantown, Laytonsville, Montgomery Village, North Potomac and Poolesville.

The 20-member Board advises the Director of the Upcounty Government Services Center, the County Executive, elected officials, and government staff. It provides input on which services and programs should be provided and how they will be delivered. The Board reviews and comments on the County's capital and operating budgets and master plans; assists with strategies to tailor services to regional needs; and conducts workshops and forums. Some members represent the Board on other ad hoc committees.

Members serve three-year terms without compensation, meeting certain Monday evenings of every month and occasionally on Saturdays. Members are expected to serve on at least one subcommittee, which meets approximately one evening every month on its own schedule. We work with a wide range of social, land use, infrastructure, and public safety issues. We are committed to rational development planning and protection of the Agricultural Reserve, this is particularly relevant to Darnestown, as our community is immediately adjacent to it and the rural village nature reflected in planning and zoning is directly inflluenced by the Agricultural Reserve. As a representative representing Darnestown, I am committed to communicating issues of importance to our community up to the County government, and carry news and information back to our community. #### **Utility Reliability**

The ongoing dialog with PEPCO continues. The writer completed his assignment with the Montgomery County PEPCO Work Group. Our comments were filed with the Public Service Commission as part of case 9240. The Office of People's Council and the Maryland Energy Department also filed briefs. Fines and rate reductions or corrections that are at PEPCO's expense have been suggested, all of which are well within PSC powers. In the next month, the PSC will have to decide what, if any, order it will issue to PEPCO. It has been one year since the original case against PEPCO was begun, so quick is not the strength of the system. PEPCO's position has been that they do not have a problem, just our

expectations have changed over time and they must now keep up. Their poor performance and illogical rejoinders makes it difficult to have confidence that the system will get any better. We have not been tested with a storm the likes of 2010, so we are unable to judge the progress, if any. Blue sky outages also continue.

During the last quarter the tree trimming practices of PEPCO became an issue. We had reason to believe that PEPCO was less than forthright with people from whom they sought authorization to "trim" trees on private property. Trees on public roads are "protected" by various laws but how well they are followed or enforced seems problematic. On roads deemed "rustic" PEPCO is not given as free a hand as other roads. The equivalent of clear cutting was noted on several Darnestown Roads. PEPCO has taken the position that since they have expanded to a 4 year trimming cycle, if a tree threatens to grow enough in four years to compromise their lines, they are authorized to remove the tree now. The County Council held hearings on the issue and PEPCO's desire for greater removal authority. The Council rejected their request. Serious compromises to property values may have been caused by the heavy handed approach.

In June we filed comments to the PSC on PEPCO's annual reliability report. Regrettably Darnestown feeders 15238, 15230, 15235 and 15237 have over the last 3 years remained in the spot light of the 2% worst feeders in PEPCO's system. Our thoughts to PSC were that there seems to be a problem in our town that requires broader attention than one feeder at a time. PSC has not deemed a response necessary which is not surprising. They are wont not to tell PEPCO how to run its business. It is clear that the substation on Route 118 is not our friend when it comes to keeping our lights on.

Please continue to let me know if you have experienced an outage as there at least 4 and probably more feeders that impact Darnestown. Right now, my feeder 15238 has been well behaved for the last 5 months.

#### **New Personnel**

#### Darne Bloomers Garden Club

September's cooler weather and moist soils offer ideal conditions for fall planting and preparing for the winter months and next spring season.



Below is a list of fall gardening tips:

- Late summer into early autumn is the best time to divide perennials that bloom in spring and summer.
- Plant trees and shrubs, allowing enough time for roots to develop before ground freezes.
- Prepare for first frost. Dig tender perennials such as cannas, begonias, and gladiolus. Discard tops and store bulbs, corms, and rhizomes in dry peat moss or vermiculite.

- Bring house plants back indoors before night temperatures drop below 55F.
- Deadhead perennials, and discard dead and diseased foliage to reduce infection next year.
- Begin planting spring flowering bulbs in mid-to-late September.
- Fertilize and mulch trees after mid-September.
- Apply broadleaf weed killers to lawn.
- Restock bird feeders and put out fresh water to help birds migrating south.
- Once you have cleaned up flowering beds, spread a layer of mulch over them. You don't have to use bagged mulch. Just rake or blow leaves onto the garden beds.

Fall is a good time to buy from nurseries because they have terrific sales. The selection may not be huge, but there will be some great bargains, even for trees.

While you are bargain hunting, look for the yard sale bargains if you need to replace any gardening tools.

Here's how to plant 100 flowering bulbs in 30 minutes.

First: Excavate an area 5 feet square, 5-6 inches deep. Place the soil on a sheet of plywood or cardboard.

Then: Space the bulbs about 4 inches apart and position points up. Some bulbs may end up sideways or upside when covered. However, they will grow properly thanks to geotropism...plants will grow opposite gravity.

Next: Slide the soil from the plywood back onto the bulbs and tamp down lightly.

The original instigators were Betty Foley, Libby Fisher and Patti Miller. It all began with these ladies sitting around the Darnestown pool talking about gourmet food and gardening. home and they continued to meet in homes for the first several meetings. Soon, Betty Foley contacted the National Garden Club to come and speak about the benefits of membership. The idea was welcomed. Betty was elected the first president and she served for three years. The other officers were: Vice-President—Patti Miller, Treasurer—Rita Scherping, and Co-Secretaries—Ginny Willever and Carol Brezovec.

The first program was a demonstration using magnolia leaves through a process that yielded lace-like leaves, and arranging flowers in antique containers. During these early years, the by-laws were written and a logo was designed.

One of the unique problems that the new club had was the need for child care. A child care system that allowed members to rotate in the babysitting job, and not be penalized for missing the meeting was arranged.

Naming the club was voted by the members. Darne Bloomers Garden Club won by a close second to Darnestown Gourmet Gardening Club.


#### Darnestown Presbyterian Church Bazaar

#### Championship Returns to Western Darnestown Cody Lang (for Western Darnestown)

As the sun sank toward the horizon on yet another uncomfortably sizzling Darnestown evening, Doug "Speedylegs" Santangelo approached the plate. Digging the worn treads of his Reeboks into the batter's box unsettled the dust at his feet, but not his resolve. He stared deeply into the eyes of Highlands pitcher, Steve Waechter, striving to remember his habits, his tendencies, and hopefully his weaknesses. And he recalled: his inside slowball tended to the high, inside corner of the strike zone. 'Perfect for a pull hitter like me,' Doug thought. A step back in the batter's box, a loping swing and a swift sprint down the base-path later. "Speedylegs" had yet again secured the first hit of the game. And thus began Western Darnestown's underdog 15-1 victory for the championship of the 2011 Darnestown Softball League.

The 2011 season began drippingly different than it ended. To say "the seas were a-stormin" would be an understatement, as the first two weeks of play were rained out, causing the season to start a month later than

usual. But the competitors of Darnestown remained undaunted, and, despite the invasion of an unusually vindictive gnat population, the League managed to make up all missed games. Not to mention, the only forfeit of the season was due to an unfortunate season-ending injury that brought an otherwise strong Bondy-Haddonfield-Ridgefield team to its aging, soon-to-bereplaced knees. In addition to the normal quota of pulled hammies, quads, and sore shoulders, the season racked up a number of more serious injuries, including torn Achilles, ACLs, and broken bones, which hampered the efforts of such former powerhouses as BHR, HL and BS. In fact, maintaining a relatively young and healthy team may have proved to be Western Darnestown's ace-inthe-hole for the 2011 season.

Highlands blew out of the gates with an astounding 3-0 start, leaving the rest of the League with records as crippling as the injuries their players sported. With definitive wins over BHR, ARMO, and BS, Western Darnestown gained and held the lead for the rest of the season, despite the plague of hazardous heat and humidity.

Western Darnestown co-captain Brian Lang attributed his team's success to "an infusion of young blood" and a blond-haired, large-framed man of supreme athleticism he chose not to name. The wives of these young bucks willingly stepped up during a pinch, bolstering the roster and keeping the team well above the seven-player minimum. This year's win brings Western Darnestown's ring count to three, and the team has opted for a threekarat ruby surrounded by three deep-set diamonds to commemorate their third championship in 8 years.

It was a season filled with rain and heat, strikes and balls, wins and losses, but most importantly, a competitive streak that refuses to fade away. Despite devoting their lives to jobs, children, and mortgages, every summer Sunday goes to softball, the only sport that allows the citizens of Darnestown to relive the athletic glory days, one pitch at a time.




