The DC Area Transportation Planning Board (TPB) is considering a possible future crossing over the Potomac River to connect major transportation centers in Virginia and Maryland.


The Darnestown Civic Association (DCA) conducted an online survey in October to help the DCA understand the community's position on this issue.



A Pleasant View for Darnestown

As you drive on Darnestown Road south past Quince Orchard you may have noticed several large, new beds of blooming native perennials, shrubs and trees at the historic Pleasant View site. Earth Stewardship East, an LDS faithbased non-profit, was awarded a grant from the Chesapeake Bay Trust to complete a major storm water management, native plant landscaping and public education project at Pleasant View. Our project will be completed in 2018, in time to mark the 150th anniversary of the purchase of this property by freed slaves.

Feel free to stop by Pleasant View (11810 Darnestown Road) and explore this new native garden. By next year the plants should begin to fill out the beds. We will be adding plant tags and signs by next spring to enhance the public education value of this garden. You might find plants growing there that you would like to try in your own garden. Future improvements include adding rain barrels to collect and direct rain water to the native garden beds. Match Hanson is submitting plans for an Eagle Scout project to add a stone path linking the sidewalk with our garden area, making the site more welcoming to visitors.

Please join us in this amazing opportunity to make a significant positive environmental impact -- and share in an historic celebration. To date we've had 200+ volunteers at our various events. Youth can earn SSL hours. Contact Merikay Smith at <u>merikays@verizon.net</u> to become one of our volunteers.

This fall we are adding native trees and shade plants. We have a major volunteer day on Saturday, November 18 starting at 10 am to mulch and prepare the beds for winter. For info on this and future events at Pleasant View visit <u>www.eartheast.org</u>. The website also has information on the history of Pleasant View. You might also find the sections on native plants or local trails of interest.

Funds for the plants and supplies come through the Montgomery County Water Protection Fund (in part from the 5-cent charge on plastic bags -- some consolation the next time you're charged for forgetting your recycling grocery bag).



The Darnestown Civic Association (DCA) conducted an online survey in October to help the DCA understand the community's position on this issue.

Over 450 responses from Darnestown residents were received with the results shown in the graph below.

While no specific proposals are currently under consideration by the TPB, it is clear from our survey that there is interest in having a bridge, but not a bridge that would pass through Darnestown.

The DCA will continue to take positive steps to protect our community and will continue to monitor the efforts of the TPB on this issue.

Police Blotter from the Past - 1920 By Jack Toomey

Beverly Hoffman, a chauffeur by trade, was employed to take a couple from Washington to Rockville to get married. While attempting to turn his machine around in a tight space near the courthouse, Hoffman struck William Griffith, a Laytonsville farmer, hurling him to the ground. Griffith suffered severe injuries and had to be carried from the scene. In the meantime, Hoffman was charged with reckless driving and having no operator's card. While waiting for his trial to begin, Hoffman drove the engaged couple to the home of Rev. Wagner, who married them. He then from them to Washington, but he did not return to Rockville for his trial. Officials are still looking for him.

John Green of Washington was arrested and charged with having whiskey in his possession. He had been attempting to sell it to passersby in Rockville.

Deputies Gingell and Hitchinson arrested **Samuel Clagett** and charged him with a violation of the National Prohibition law. A number of personas had reported that people had been seen visiting Clagett's house near Emory Grove and then leaving in an intoxicated condition. The deputies seized several barrels of hard cider and a quantity of wine.

A fire of unknown origin destroyed the barn of **Dr. Jacob Bird** near Sandy Spring. Two new automobiles were destroyed and another damaged. A building used by the Social Services league of the county was burned down and large quantities of hay, straw, and feed were also lost. To horses were killed in the fire. The home of Doctor bird, about two hundred feet away, also ignited, but the flames were extinguished before much damage was done.

I have a few minor criticisms including some holes in the plot and an uneven story line progression, at times. The last 20 minutes, including the highly-anticipated reenactment of one of the key battles, seem rushed and anticlimactic. The short epilogue provides follow-up and a few photos of the main characters but it left me with a pessimistic, unresolved feeling.

I recommend this movie to anyone who seeks an understanding of the reality of what our troops are enduring on and off the battlefield. I give "Thank You for Your Service" an 8.0 on the ABBONDANZOMETER (Scale of 1-10).

THANK YOU FOR YOUR SERVICE

"Thank You for Your Service" is a 109-minute R Rated Biographical Drama directed by Jason Hall starring Miles Teller (Adam Schumann), Haley Bennett (Saskia Schumann), Beulah Cole (Solo), Amy Schumer (Amanda Doster) and Scott Haze (Michael Adam Emory).

This film is adapted from the non-fiction book by David Finkel (2013), an editor and former reporter for the Washington Post. It opens in April 2007 on the battlefield of Iraq and follows the lives of 3 soldiers, in particular, after their return to the US. All are suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) which threatens their lives and their relationships with families and friends.

This movie is an outstanding screenplay adaptation of a sobering subject on many levels. It is a heart wrenching, genuine depiction of the difficult time our soldiers face trying to assimilate back into civilian life. The casting/acting is outstanding, especially Miles Teller who has described this as the most important acting role in his life. The real Adam Schumann was an advisor on the set and briefly appears in the movie. I enjoyed seeing Amy Schumer in a dramatic, rather than her usual comedic, role. The film is difficult to watch, at times, because of the incredibly realistic battlefield scenes, grisly wounds, and emotional scars related to the traumatic memories which are impossible to leave behind. There is a disturbing dogfighting scene which fortunately has a happy ending. Everyone involved in this movie has done a terrific job of portraying the suicide ideation, depression, fractured relationships and substance abuse which are associated with PTSD.

BLAIR WITCH

The Blair Witch Project, released in 1999, is a psychological horror film written, directed, and edited by local filmmakers Daniel Myrick and Eduardo Sánchez. The film tells the fictional story of three student-filmmakers hiking in the Black Hills near Burkittsville, Maryland in 1994 to film a documentary about a local legend known as the "Blair Witch". The legend describes the disappearances and killings of some of the residents of Blair, Maryland (a fictitious town on the site of modern Burkittsville), most of whom were children, from the 18th through 20th centuries. Residents blamed these occurrences on the "Blair Witch", the ghost of Elly Kedward, who was a Blair resident accused of practicing witchcraft in 1785 and sentenced to death. In the film, the three student filmmakers disappeared, but their video and sound equipment, along with most of the footage they shot, was discovered a year later, neatly placed along the roadside of Rt. 340 West. This "recovered footage" is the film the viewer is watching.

The film received tremendous and unexpected acclaim from critics. It became a resounding box office success – grossing over \$248 million worldwide, making it one of the most successful independent films of all time.

Local Darnestown residents **Sue and Ingrid Gooch** had a small but, as it turned out, surprisingly popular role in the movie! They appear several times in the beginning of the film as local residents who are interviewed by the student-filmmakers.

In addition, local Darnestown residents **Richard and Ingrid Fraley** also played a pivotal role in the film, albeit behind the scenes!

Unbeknownst to most people, the majority of the film was shot right here in Darnestown off of Black Rock Road!

The Blair Witch Experience

Author Matt Blazi and director Ed Sánchez recently hosted an event entitled "The Blair Witch Experience" commemorating the 20th anniversary of the filming of the movie. Over the course of three days, participants in the event visited most of the sites on which critical scenes from the movie were filmed, they camped out overnight in Patapsco State Park, just as the student characters in the movie had done, and they got to meet many of the actors and other people involved the film. **Ingrid Fraley** and **Sue & Ingrid Gooch** were among the surprise guests for fans, some of whom had come from as far away as Seattle, England, and Germany to take part in the event.

Our Unusual Night – An Experience with the Blair Witch Project By Ingrid Fraley

Surrounded by Seneca State Park, our home was off the beaten path, serviced by a long driveway. We have a unique place where we enjoy privacy, seclusion, and of course the four-legged inhabitants that live in the adjoining 1,800 acres. So, imagine our surprise one chilly, rainy October night when unannounced visitors, who have always been few and far between (and we <u>never</u> have trick and treaters) showed up on our secluded doorstep.

In 1997, the week before Halloween was unusually cold, blustery and rainy, and this particular evening was indeed the proverbial "dark and stormy night."

Richard and I were just "buttoning" up the house when there was a knock on our front door. After exchanging questioning glances and a few words about who should go first, I opened the door to find a young woman garbed in a soggy poncho, shivering and asking if she could use our phone.

As a reminder to the reader, this was 20 years ago. We did not have the technology that we have grown accustomed to enjoying today, such as cell phones and GPS programs. Land lines and pay phones were the norm.

Apprehensively, we said "sure", only to find that there were two other people with her, all in the same cold, wet, unhappy situation. But something was a bit different. They had a good deal of equipment wrapped in plastic... cameras?? Once inside, we asked them the obvious question: "What are you doing out in the woods?" Their response was chilling: "We're making a movie about witches." Oh my!

As we invited them in, Richard remarked, "This is either going to be just fine or it will be a really bad idea." Clothing was placed in the dryer, hot chocolate was served in steaming mugs, and we settled into conversation about their "project" - a story about three students researching the history of the Blair Witch. Little did we know at the time that we were now hosting the soon-to-be famous lost trio of Heather, Josh, and Mike.

The three had become separated from their ground crew while filming in Seneca State Park, arriving on our doorstep when they spotted our porch light. While they had emergency plans in place, the storm had disrupted their ability to communicate with their ground crew.

The evening ended when a white van drove cautiously down our long gravel road, ready to retrieve the actors. Well wishes and sincere offers of thanks were exchanged.

And then in a moment I think we might always halfregret, on her way out, Heather asked if we would like to invest in their film. We declined. Only months later, when there was buzz in the media about a "witch movie", did we start to understand the role that we had played behind the scenes in the film and the opportunity that we had missed!

Dutifully, we went to see the movie and smiled when the credits included our names!

Whole Wheat Beer Bread

Great with soups or chili on a cold winter night! Makes excellent toast, too! The flavor of the bread will change depending on the type of beer used. The loaf comes out looking textured and crusty on top!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 ½ cups all-purpose bread flour
- 1 ½ cups whole wheat flour
- 4 ½ teaspoons baking powder
- 1 ½ teaspoons salt
- 1/3 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 (12-fluid ounce) bottle or can of been

Place all DRY ingredients in a Mason jar with a decorative lid and attach the following instructions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Lightly grease a 9x5 inch loaf pan.
- Empty all ingredients from the Mason jar into a large mixing bowl. Pour in a beer of your choice, stir until a stiff batter is formed. It may be necessary to mix dough with your hands. Scrape dough into prepared loaf pan.
- 3. Bake in preheated oven for 50 to 60 minutes, until a toothpick inserted into center of the loaf comes out clean.



Homesteading Corner!

Prevent Plumbing Problems

No one wants to have to call a plumber; not only can that be a messy experience, but also a pricey one. To help prevent having to make that call, here is a list of common plumbing problems and how you can avoid them.

Water heater: If your home has hard water your water heater may need to be drained to remove build-up on the bottom of the tank. If this sediment isn't cleaned out, it can clog water lines making your water heater less efficient.

Toilet: Don't just flush anything, be selective about what goes down your toilet. The only item that you should flush is toilet paper. Items that can clog your toilet and cause a problem are cotton balls, cleaning wipes, and trash. These items are not made to dissolve and some will actually expand in water. If your toilet starts to overflow, shut off the water supply until you can call a plumber.

Kitchen Sink: The kitchen sink gets clogged when you put in items that shouldn't go in the sink, such as grease, fats, and cooking oil. These items will clog your sink because they stick to pipes and solidify when they cool, which causes blockage. Avoid pouring these items down the sink, instead pour them into a can or bottle to thrown away. Occasionally pouring boiling water down the sink can help melt and wash away built up grease.

Shower drain: Hair is the primary reason why a shower drain gets clogged since hair doesn't dissolve in water. Using a shower strainer will help trap hair before it goes down the drain.

Fix That Drip

Next time you fill your cup with water, think about this: We each use about 100 gallons of water per day, which fills about 1,600 glasses. The consumption of household water has increased by 200 percent since the 50's, even though the population has grown by only 90 percent. As a result, many states are expected to face water shortages. Reducing the flow of water leaving our household is as easy as fixing a leaky faucet or toilet; a dripping faucet can waste up to 74 gallons a day, and a leaking toilet up to 200 gallons a day. Repairing a leaky toilet can save \$30 a year, which may not sound like much, but that is equivalent to about 73,000 gallons.

Purify with Plants

Indoor air quality is important, and people spend thousands of dollars on purifiers, hepa vacuums, and filters, in order to keep their air clean. NASA did a study to find out which plants not only released oxygen, but also were the best at filtering the air for the space station. You can use these plants in your home or office to improve the quality of the air in your space. These are common plants that can be found at your local nursery and added to your space today. The top 10 plants most effective in removing air pollutants:

Icy Walkways

As winter approaches, check out these products that can help you walk with confidence and give you better traction.

For your front entry, use an ice-melting doormat. An electric doormat melts the snow as it falls, up to a rate of 2 inches per hour.

Try using rubberized treads on outdoor stairs. Before the icy weather starts, add rubberized stair treads to steps that release ice with a stomp that you can brush away.

Sidewalk granules won't melt the ice, but they will embed into the ice and give you a more secure footing.

On smooth floors such as the garage, try slip-resistant tapes. Slip-resistant tapes will help you with traction when getting in and out of your car where ice has melted.

Butler Montessori School 🥤

This school year started off with fabulous news! Butler Montessori received the *Bethesda Green Award for Leading by Example as a Non-Profit*. Our school was recognized for commitment to organic gardens and chickens, trails for exploration, and incorporating green practices both in and out of the classroom.

Around campus Butler Montessori recently installed bamboo composite decking and permeable boardwalks to help filter water and reduce pollution. Our buildings were designed to blend into the rural landscape and whenever possible, students are given responsibilities to participate in the improvements on campus. They recently researched and designed a fulcrum to move a 1,000-pound log in order to utilize land for better purposes.

Students feed our chickens with their lunch scraps, participate in a school wide composting program, and learn about crop rotation while caring for the soil. The seventh and eighth graders run a micro-economy program selling garden vegetables and products they

make from their harvest, such as jams, pesto and cookies.

Butler Montessori also recently received a grant from the Chesapeake Bay Trust to install "conservation landscaping". This grant will help mitigate damage caused by pollutants carried by storm water runoff from the school's main building roof to the Seneca Creek watershed and ultimately the Chesapeake Bay.

Our older students are creating and giving presentations based on pre-existing lessons in the Montessori curriculum regarding erosion to the younger students explaining storm water runoff, its effect on the Seneca Creek Watershed down to the Chesapeake Bay, and how conservation landscaping helps slow and spread storm water, thus reducing the pollutants that enter the creek.

We are proud of our commitment to green practices and the Chesapeake Bay while striving to teach both our students and surrounding community to continue this environmental stewardship. This September, Mary of Nazareth began the new school year with a new approach to instruction. Jennifer Massey, Middle School Science teacher states, STREAM will provide opportunities for students to think critically and deeply in new and creative ways. In science, we will be using engineering practices to solve real-world problems across the science disciplines. This is also the focus for this year's seventh grade science fair." In this way, learners gain mastery of content by employing a variety of skills, modalities and intelligences. Most importantly, inquiry-based approaches to learning, such as STREAM, allow students to see value in what they're doing as they apply content to real-life problems and scenarios.

Earlier this year, Mary of Nazareth generated steam for its STREAM initiative with a successful summer camp, professional development, and teacher planning sessions. The camp welcomed elementary aged students to explore the wonders of water in an interactive learning environment. A variety of educational technology was used during the camp to enhance student experience, including virtual reality field trips. Other camp activities included exploring careers in water conservation and marine biology, creating clouds in a jar, testing pH and water samples, building rain gauges, and making squirt-gun art. Mary of Nazareth is a Blue Ribbon School, serving children in Upper Montgomery County, grades prekindergarten to eight.
