# **President's Corner**

### **Notes from the President**

One of the first things I typically ask someone is "Where are you originally from?" or "Where'd you grow up?". I instinctively ask that not just because it's interesting or a conversation starter, but because where someone has grown up or lived can really frame their perspective ... and that's what I find the most interesting. So, at the pool this past summer I started chatting with a couple whose child is on my son's 2nd grade soccer team. I coach, so this was one of the first times I'd had to really hang out and talk. They'd moved here a few years ago and were raving about what an incredible community Darnestown is. Originally from California, they had never experienced the type of community we have. And they didn't mean the houses or streets or open space, they meant "community"—the people and the bonds we share. Even something as simple as the majority of Darnestown kids going to the same elementary school. Where they'd come from, kids weren't even guaranteed to go to their local public school—you literally had to get in line in time to get the school you wanted or your kids would be assigned to some other random school. It made me realize that Darnestown Elementary is a real bedrock of our community and how lucky we are to have it.

And while I was completely blown away by the whole school thing in California—that's just crazy, I was also blown away by just how much these folks cherished this community. I honestly had to think

about that—why was I so blown away? I'd grown up in Darnestown and love Darnestown, but perhaps I was taking it for granted. Naively, I don't think I'd realized things could be so different or, for that matter, just *how* special we are.

These conversations stuck with me, and as I spoke with other neighbors I began to realize, much more than I had before, just how much passion there is for our community and the strong desire for more of that "community" in their lives. That was never more evident than at our December Holiday Tree Lighting, where more than 250 neighbors came out to the Darnestown Heritage Park next to the Harris Teeter to celebrate the holidays together under the lights. Kids made ornaments and ate s'mores and 30 students from the Darnestown Elementary School chorus led everyone in singing before the tree was lit with a cheer. It felt like a Hallmark movie in our village. So much so, I'm still convinced that among the revelers there must have been some city slicker, begrudgingly stuck in Darnestown for the holidays, who met a local and they're now planning to spend the rest of their lives here together.

I've said before, the DCA is taking a fresh look at what we do. What I really should say is that we're taking a fresh perspective, and we want that perspective to come from you. One important way we're doing this is by re-evaluating our social calendar and gearing our community events to what you want. We received an incredible response to our social events survey in January, led by our new Social Chair Stephanie Kunkle. Stephanie is taking that feedback and developing a social calendar for this year that will keep the best of the old, while adding in many new events.

At our last town meeting, an open session for dialogue and feedback yielded some very thought-provoking suggestions. To see those, please visit **darnestowncivic.org**. We are going to do the same thing in our March Town Meeting, so if there are issues you care about or things you think can make us a better community, please come out so we can all talk about it.

Community also struck a chord as the DCA got engaged in the new Thrive Montgomery 2050 initiative. Initiated by the County Council and driven by the MC Planning Department, this initiative will result a general plan update—the only other update to the 1964 general plan occurred in 1969, with a refinement in1993. Is that a big deal? Yes, because the General Plan outlines the high-level strategic approach for land use (zoning), transportation, community design, housing, environment and a socio-economic framework that is the basis for all

county master plans. The general plan informs the 20-year 'Potomac Subregion Master Plan,' which is the master blueprint for zoning and transportation in and around Darnestown. That 2002 Master Plan is due for a revision and we expect that will follow shortly on the heels of the new General Plan.

So how did this Thrive effort strike a chord when it comes to community? Well, in the most simple terms, the Thrive Issues Report—the first step leading up to the formal plan and our first opportunity for official input—laid out a vision for a "complete" community and development based on things such as proximity to mass transportation, mixed use development, and high density population. To learn more, in November, the DCA Board received an outline of the goals of the plan from the Thrive Project Manager. While we understand that much of this plan targets more urban parts of the county, we feel strongly that the unique values of Darnestown as a rural residential community and its importance as a transition area adjoining the Agricultural Reserve should be recognized and embraced.

The DCA's response (see **darnestowncivic.org**) stresses the uniqueness of Darnestown, while acknowledging the necessary work being done to prepare for Montgomery County's growth. As the DCA stays actively engaged in the planning process, we will communicate updates and actively solicit your feedback for our future responses.

### Vision Zero

by DCA Roads Task Force

As highlighted in the Notes from the President in the December *Little Acorn*, the DCA Roads Task Force has been formed. We plan to address a wide range of road-related issues. Part of our work is to ensure Darnestown is a recognized stakeholder and to raise community awareness of important safety initiatives like the relatively new county policy called Vision Zero **montgomerycountymd.gov/visionzero.** 

In 2017 Montgomery County adopted Vision Zero as policy. After an intensive two-year ramp up phase, the program is now in full motion. According to the Vision Zero Network, Vision Zero is "a strategy to eliminate all traffic fatalities and severe injuries, while increasing safe, healthy, equitable mobility for all." Vision Zero acknowledges that traffic deaths and severe injuries are preventable and sets the goal of eliminating both in a set period with clear, measurable strategies. This is a major shift for

most North American communities by establishing clear accountability to ensure safe mobility. History has shown, as with campaigns to reduce drunk driving and initiatives to increase recycling, that changing cultural attitudes and ensuring political accountability can make a dramatic difference and increase the success of the program.

Vision Zero is a multidisciplinary approach, bringing together diverse and necessary stakeholders to address this complex problem. In the past, meaningful, cross-disciplinary collaboration among local traffic planners and engineers, law enforcement officials, policymakers, and public health professionals has not been the norm. Vision Zero acknowledges that there are many factors that contribute to safe mobility—including roadway design, speeds, enforcement, behaviors, technology, and policies—and sets clear goals to achieve the shared goal of zero fatalities and severe injuries. The DCA Roads Task Force endeavors to be a part of the this initiative, focusing on the Darnestown area.

# The Use of 'Darnestown' as Your City Name

We have been hearing from a number of Darnestown residents, primarily newcomers, who have been told the use of Darnestown for their postal address is not correct. This is not so.

For 30 years, our family owned and operated a mailing service. It was part of our job to know and recognize cities and locations to be known by both their Postal name and other "vanity" names officially accepted by the Postal Service. The most notable use of those vanity names associated with a particular Zip Code, 20854, is "Potomac." The official city name for Zip Code 20854 is Rockville. Good luck telling a resident whose Zip Code is 20854 they must start using Rockville as their city address.

So, what do we need to do, if we want the Postal Service to continue recognizing Darnestown as an acceptable city name? Keep using it. Not using Darnestown in your return address or when you give out your address can lead the Postal Service to thinking it is no longer necessary. Use Darnestown in all forms and questionnaires you complete. Some will only accept Germantown (20874) or Gaithersburg (20878), if you put the Zip Code in first.

Remember, Darnestown is a historical name and it is where you and your family live. Like so many things, if you don't use it and defend it, you can lose it.

### **5G** and Antenna Locations

The County Council is once again considering the alteration of the zoning codes to allow the cell phone suppliers to add or modify utility poles on your street. The two issues one needs to understand are the health impact (if any) and the ability of the cell phone companies to install or modify the towers with little or no notice to the homeowner.

The issue around the health impact is that no recent studies exist on microwave energy impact on children or adults. Earlier studies focused on heat impacts on tissue, not other pathologies. The


one concerning fact is that Lloyds of London will not provide adverse health impact insurance to the phone companies. One wonders what if they know something.

The other impact could be to those who now live on streets with buried utility services. If you live on such a street you have, at most, small graceful streetlights. The new code would permit the installer to modify those street lights by extending their height and adding an antenna to the top and a large connection box on the bottom. The small current light poles are probably too weak to be modified and a whole new pole with an additional 10-15 feet would be installed. Also the poles are not like current cell phone towers; the new towers are numerous and about 500 feet apart. The new rules would permit such towers to be within 60 feet of a residential structure. The objective is to eventually have 5,000 such towers around the county. How these towers are permitted, what notice needs to be provided and the permitting of a series of towers as a unit are all issues to be addressed

Some history might explain the conundrum. The FCC has mandated that the entire country have a 5G system because it carries much more data and faster than the current 4G system. In so mandating, the FCC has tried to usurp local controls. FCC mandates that health issues can NOT be used to oppose siting approval. This is being litigated as no real health impact data was provided. The need for 5G in residential areas is the core issue. Do you really need a 5G system in a low population density area like Darnestown? The towers already have been installed in commercial areas and along major (nonresidential) highways. The State was considering its own implementation rules that could override County rules. Some areas outside Maryland have placed restrictions siting esthetic consideration and some places are keeping the towers away from schools and day care centers.

By the time you read this, the County could have adopted a zoning text amendment to grant the cell phone companies the authority they want to install the towers. The Council could have chosen to await the results of the litigation or see what State action may be forthcoming.

# **School Safety**

We are blessed to live in a relatively safe community. To continue that safety, we must be prepared and observant of what is happening in other areas that affect our residents. We need to consider the safety of our students in not only our two elementary schools, but also the middle and high schools where our students continue their education.

I am concerned by some fights that have occurred in the county. These fights appear to be by groups of young men meeting at a specific location to fight each other. In one such fight in Kensington, a young man was stabbed with a pocket knife. MCPS sent out a letter indicating there had been a fight and that they were taking unspecified actions to protect the students.

What can we do? Listen to your kids or grandkids. Mention your concern to your spouse or someone else, when the children are around. Have a little discussion about what you think may be happening and, if the kids chime in, listen. What do you do with the information? Discuss it with other adults and compare notes without attribution to your source. If you hear something you think may help figure out who or why these fights are starting or anything else that may indicate the possibility of a problem, report

it to a school resource officer, teacher, principal, or police officer. If you are not comfortable discussing possible leads with any of the aforementioned, call me (301) 674-3451 and I will pass it along, again without attribution to you.

Remember, one piece of information means very little; but, the same piece of information from several different sources may prevent a tragedy.

### **Ask Diana**

# Diana Foley answers questions about pet behavior and training



Q: Our dog is extremely dog reactive. We have taken classes but struggle with how to communicate to OTHER dog owners (especially with dogs off leash) that we need them to change directions, turn around, or generally avoid us so our dog doesn't go crazy. Hard to believe this sweetie is

aggressive, but she's been attacked in the past.

A: Thank you for your question and for including a photo of your beautiful dog! I, too, live with a "dog-reactive" dog. For those unfamiliar with the term "dog-reactive," this refers to a dog who barks, growls, lunges or reacts aggressively towards other dogs. While the behavior can look very assertive and threatening, it is often caused by fear and insecurity. It's a surprisingly common behavior problem, and it can be frustrating, embarrassing, and frightening to deal with when your dog is acting out.

You are on exactly the right track—your dog's reactive behavior is her way of telling you she feels threatened and needs space from the approaching dog, and the way to accomplish this is by changing directions, turning around, or otherwise creating distance between yourself and the other dog. Unfortunately, we can't control the behavior of the other human holding the leash, so the responsibility to create that space falls on you. This is easier said than done because many owners of friendly dogs may assume that all dogs are friendly, or that all dogs will be "fine" with their dog, and will ignore your signals. If you think your dog may pose a danger to another dog. I encourage you to continue working with a professional trainer who can help you put a long-term training plan in place to help you calm and manage your dog, and to practice for emergencies like an off-leash dog. In some cases, this behavior can be resolved and in other cases it requires lifelong management, but there's always room for improvement. Local resources for positive trainers who have experience with dog reactivity include Your Dog's Friend in Rockville and Peaceable Paws in Fairplay. The latter is a bit of a hike, but top-notch training that is well worth the drive. They offer a weekend training workshop on this particular topic.
