# **President's Corner**

### Notes from the President

Just six months ago, in the March 2020 issue of *The Little Acorn*, I started off my 'Notes from the President' with:

One of the first things I typically ask someone is "Where are you originally from?" or "Where'd you grow up?" I instinctively ask that not just because it's interesting or a conversation starter but because where someone has grown up or lived can really frame their perspective ... and that's what I find the most interesting.

I wasn't trying to sound cerebral or deeply insightful. I'm just so influenced by growing up and living in Darnestown that I'm kind of fascinated by neighbors originally from other cities, other states, and even other countries who have come to call Darnestown "home." But it wasn't until recently that I realized just how short-sighted even this perspective was ... where someone was *physically* from or where they *literally* grew up.

For me, a white, blonde-haired kid, growing up in Darnestown was pretty easy and I assumed it was the same for all of the other kids I grew up with. I never gave it much thought until a conversation about a month ago. That's when I spoke with one of our residents who also grew up in Darnestown around the same time as me. She shared her experiences as an African American female growing up in predominantly white Darnestown. As you can imagine, we had different experiences—in

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some cases very different. There were many things that I took for granted that she couldn't. There were challenges she had to face that I never realized even existed. Well, at least I never associated any of those challenges to Darnestown.

I have to admit that really hit me, probably because it struck so close to home. I'm still not sure if it was just naivety or a blind spot in my awareness. The reason doesn't really matter. What matters is *her* experiences and that those experiences, and her perspectives from those, are very real. The opportunity to have those shared and to shed light on something I wasn't even aware of is a gift.

This story was shared with several members of the DCA Board who met with a group of our residents concerned with diversity, equity, and inclusion within Darnestown. Most of those in the group were residents of color from varying backgrounds who also shared their perspectives—all incredibly enlightening. One of the outcomes from these meetings was a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) statement that was started by the DCA this past summer but not finalized. We collaborated and the statement was approved by the DCA Board and is posted on the home page of our website [see Sara Hunter's article below].

This statement isn't just words. It isn't just a one-time effort to check a box, as so many corporations have done since this past summer. This is a step in defining who we are as a community and who we will be. It is a step toward establishing a culture of acceptance and inclusion, regardless of where you're from or your race, gender, age, religion, or sexual orientation. It's a step forward in appreciating the value of diversity that makes us a great community.

I'm very proud of our Darnestown community. I think for the most part we're very inclusive and certainly are much more diverse than when I grew up in the 1980s. But are we perfect? No. Is there more we can do to make sure everyone is welcome and included? Yes. Every family should feel that their differences are valued. No child, no adult, and no family should ever feel excluded or should ever feel out of place in Darnestown. It's the responsibility of each of us who call Darnestown 'home' to make sure of that and to do everything we can to foster an inclusive community for all of our neighbors.

#### DCA Statement on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

Following the national events of this past summer, a group of concerned Darnestown residents reached out to the DCA to stress the importance of having a public statement from the DCA demonstrating its commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI). Such a statement did not exist and all agreed it was important for the DCA, as the community leader, to establish its commitment and expectations for an inclusive Darnestown community.

To that end, and in a collaborative partnership between the residents and the DCA Board, the DCA homepage now features the following statement:

The DCA is committed to support diversity, inclusion, and equity within our association and across our community. Discrimination has no place in our community. We encourage civil engagement. We work to facilitate community discussion with local governing officials who make policies. Our job is to welcome a community of different voices where freedom speaks and equal justice is served.

As a member of the group that consulted on this work, I'd like to publicly commend the DCA for taking this initial small but important step to ensure our multi-ethnic, multi-generational community stays diverse, tolerant, and accepting, and that our inclusive welcome to all members of our community is front and center.

We will continue to strive to achieve this goal and more work remains ahead!

### **Road Work Ahead**

The Roads Task Force continues to build relationships with the county. In case you missed our update in *The Little Acorn* September issue (available online) you may wish to review our blitz of work over the summer. We have since met with representatives from Montgomery Planning about the Rustic Roads Master Plans, the Bicycle Master Plan, and Vision Zero. There was a presentation at our September Town Meeting and a call for community input on Rustic Roads with a successful response back to the county resulting in changes to the proposed Rustic Roads Master Plan.

We've been studying plans, current conditions, regulations, and efforts in other parts of the country,

and discussing our approach to advocating for less stressful roads. We are suggesting policy changes to reduce through traffic and make our roads easier to use for cars, bicycles, and pedestrians.

We are looking forward to asking you directly to weigh in on many additional aspects of our roads during 2021. ### Reimagining Public Safety Task Force

We live in a relatively safe community here in Montgomery County. And, we need to do everything we can to keep our community safe for our families, as well as all the families of Montgomery County. Our County Executive, Mr. Elrich, has some concerns about public safety as well, and on November 1st, sent a letter to citizens about the new "Reimagining Public Safety Task Force," a group of 46 community representatives who will "advise the County on community needs and how we may rebalance spending priorities and invest more in communities." (See letter at https://www. montgomerycountymd.gov/rps/Resources/Files/ survey/Reimagining-Public-Safety-CE-Letter-en. pdf) With this task force, Mr. Elrich hopes to promote a thoughtful discussion and review our public safety efforts. "The Task Force will report back to the County on the community's needs and interests and will make recommendations on how to accomplish these by prioritizing available funds for spending and investment to improve public safety in our communities."

To gather information on the community's needs and interests a survey was sent to residents. The time frame was very short. I learned about it on November 11th and the survey was due on November 14th, which of course was long before this article went to print. If you did not get it you can try the following: https://montgomerycountymd.seamlessdocs.com/f/rpssurvey.

The task force will gather and analyze the responses and hold a virtual community discussion with the County Executive on Thursday, December 3rd.

The point is we need to make our views known because the responses to and discussion of this survey are going to affect the funding and responsibilities of the MCPD and thereby the future safety of our citizens and their families. The Council has already introduced Bill 46-20, which would prohibit the Montgomery County Police Department from deploying School Resource Officers (SROs) to county schools. ### **Under Ground — Septic Fields**

Sewer service has been an overriding issue in Darnestown since the first farm was subdivided in the late 1950's. The large lots would not have happened if sewer service were available.

Some people want, even need, a relatively large lot. Darnestown residents, at least initially, fall into this category. We share the understanding that our water related wastes decompose in subterranean concealment not far from our homes. Feelings of horror and disgust and thoughts of disaster are common when the outflow pipe fills and backs up into our homes. It's septic—the sewer alternative. Don't allow septic to become a pejorative word in your house:

1. Put as little as possible animal or vegetable fat/ grease down your sink.

2. Do not put eggshells and coffee grounds down your sink.

These materials will clog and solidify in the soil around the effluent flow from your septic tank. This can form an impenetrable barrier. If the situation continues and more blocking occurs in your septic field, there is a potential for back up into your home.

- 3. Sanitary napkins and other similar objects should not go into the toilet.
- 4. Have your septic tank pumped out every two to five years depending on your situation and household size. It is not all that expensive, especially when compared to sewer service rates.

I have heard people say, "Haven't had a problem in 25 years. I don't need to do anything," only to have their yard dug up a year later.
