From first to fifth grade I developed confidence through challenging myself in our many activities. One big challenge for me was to break through my shyness and my goal of leading my troop in cookie sales allowed me that success. At first, ringing my neighbors' doorbells and approaching strangers at Giant seemed impossible but after some time. I realized that it was not as hard as I thought it would be. In fact, I learned to enjoy it. Not only did I end up selling the most boxes of cookies in my troop for three consecutive years, I also met people in my community and found that they loved our troop's spirit more than they loved the cookies. On the ropes courses I was able to overcome my fear of falling and realize that no matter what happened I would be safe—the harness would catch me and I would be okay. Both of these activities allowed me to overcome obstacles in a safe, supportive environment.

After the jump into life, just like the acorn, I was inspired to lay my roots, sprout, and find my own way through life. While selling cookies I was able to make connections within my community to create

my foundation. Through meeting my neighbors, I was provided with opportunities for being a Mother's Helper and I then earned the trust necessary to babysit. The roots of trust were established through these connections and after years of being on the swim team and guiding younger swimmers, working in the snack bar, and lifeguarding, I became a Lifeguard Manager. My leadership roles were developed as I was put in charge of other lifeguards, pool cleanliness, and the safety of patrons.

After gaining my confidence and my community's trust, and learning how to handle responsibilities, I have grown, branched out, and influenced others. Volunteering with our local charity, Comfort Cases, has been a major part of my life for over six years. I have enjoyed leading packing parties and helping people in need. From being the first Bat Mitzvah to have her service project focus on Comfort Cases, to now, it has always been important to me to help others feel included. When my family was given the honor to help light Darnestown's first Menorah for Hanukkah I was excited to be included and loved sharing our traditions with the Darnestown community.

Twenty-Five

By DCA Roads Task Force

Thank you for responding to our survey. We'll be bringing you the results at the September Town Meeting and on the web. We appreciate your participation and invite you to let us know of issues and concerns as they occur.

As you have likely noticed, most of our neighborhood streets do not have sidewalks. Road safety professionals often talk about the three E's: Engineering, Education, and Enforcement. It takes twenty-two feet LONGER to react at 35 mph versus 25 mph and ANOTHER twenty-nine feet LONGER to stop. A total of fifty-one feet longer. Your peripheral awareness narrows by half at 35 mph vs. 25 mph. The numbers above are for better than average drivers paying complete attention.

The safe speed in our neighborhoods is 25 mph or under. No matter how difficult, time consuming, or useless as it might seem, the safe and comfortable speed is 25 mph or under. There is no privilege or entitlement to operate your vehicle at higher speeds. In fact, you have a responsibility to operate your vehicle at or below the posted speed limit. Safe speed gives you and everyone else time to safely react.

Speeding is always someone else's problem. Speeding is a big concern. We ask that you consider whether speeding is okay when you do it. Don't be the one to proclaim, "They are not even going the speed limit!"

We can make walking safer by reducing speeds. To reduce speeds, we can start by eliminating our own speeding.

Fire Prevention

As we put the hot days of summer behind us and start thinking about cooler nights, many of us will relax around a warm fire in our homes, or enjoy an evening outside by a fire pit. But what happens if the fire you are enjoying becomes out of control? Are you prepared?

Understanding what you can do in the event of a fire is your first line of defense. The DCA was fortunate to have a very engaging fire safety presentation by Jim Resnick, retired Battalion Chief & Senior Outreach & Education Manager with the MCFRS Community Risk Reduction Team, at our March 18th town hall. For those who couldn't make it, you can still view it online by going to https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=rD-w9fVQQGfw. The fire safety presentation begins at minute 19:30.

October is Fire Prevention Month. The goal of Fire Prevention Month (and week October 3rd–9th) is to raise fire safety awareness, and help ensure your home and family are protected. This year's national theme for Fire Prevention Month is "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety" with a focus on working, in-date smoke and carbon monoxide alarms, and the different alerting (and life-saving) sounds they make. During this month, fire departments provide education to their communities, and encourage parents and loved ones to practice fire prevention and whole home safety.

Our local Montgomery County Fire and Rescue Service has designed the following safety checklist to promote safety in your home. Please review these tips and eliminate any potential hazards in your home—it could just save your life.

- 1. Does your home have smoke alarms on each level? Do you test them monthly? A working smoke alarm doubles your chances of surviving a fire. Be sure to test your smoke alarms; every smoke alarm comes with a test button. MCFRS recommends that people test their smoke alarms at least once a month. Smoke alarm units should be replaced every eight to ten years according to manufacturer's instructions. Always test your smoke alarms immediately after returning from holiday or after a longer period of absence.
- **2. Does everyone know what to do in case of a fire?** Create a home escape plan, plan two ways out of every room, choose a meeting place outside where everyone will gather after they've escaped to take attendance and practice your plan with a fire drill today. Make

sure that each escape route is as direct as possible.

- **3.** Can we find you if we need to? Are your house numbers clearly visible from the street? Please provide 5 inch numbers with contrasting background. Seconds count in an emergency.
- 4. Smoke kills—many people don't know that smoke from a fire is a major cause of fire-related deaths. Instincts may prompt people to run to safety when they encounter smoke when crawling low under smoke is the best thing to do.
- **5.** Cooking left unattended is the leading cause of home fires. Home-fire injuries often occur within the first 15 minutes of cooking.
- **6.** Call 9-1-1 and do not try to extinguish the fire. A fire can double in size every 60 seconds and a delay in notifying 9-1-1 can cause further injury/death and property damage.
- 7. Smoking materials are the leading cause of fire deaths in the United States. If you must smoke, designate an area to smoke and use large non-tip ashtrays, soak cigarette butts and ashes before discarding. These fires typically start when someone abandoned or improperly disposed of smoking materials. Never smoke in bed, when sleepy/impaired or on medication that makes you drowsy.
- **8. Don't overload electrical outlets/circuits.** Do not place cords under rugs. Replace any that are cracked, frayed or have loose connections.
- **9.** Be vigilant when using candles. Keep candles away from anything that can burn and put them out when you leave the room or go to sleep. Over the past decade, the number of candle fires has almost tripled.
- **10. Do you give space heaters space?** Keep fixed and portable space heaters at least three feet away from anything that can burn and follow all manufacturer instructions.
- 11. Do you put ashes from your fireplace or wood stove in a metal container for proper disposal? Leftover ashes and embers can start fires long after the intended fire has gone out. Properly dispose of ashes in a metal container with a lid—never in a cardboard box, plastic trash can or bag. Store the container outside away from your house/combustible material and never in the garage.

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12. Residential fire sprinklers save lives and property. Sprinklers contain/control fires. Although smoke alarms are essential in every household, they're designed to detect, not control, a fire. Consider the tax benefits when retrofitting your home with residential fire sprinklers.

Kids On Bicycles

Robb Hampton grew up riding his bike along the tree lined streets of Darnestown. Whether playing with neighborhood friends, or mountain biking through the woods, Robb's fondest childhood memories included biking. As he grew older, that love of biking only grew. What started as an easy way to explore the world around him expanded to include competing in road and mountain bike races and commuting to work daily.

When the lockdown in 2020 hit, Hampton found himself unemployed with a lot of extra time on his hands. He knew he wanted to do something positive for his community. At the same time, Hampton began to notice that similarly, many of his neighborhood kids were at odds with nothing to do.

Then, during a discussion with Ridgeview PTSA President, Jess Bellerez about food inequity in local communities, an idea suddenly struck Hampton.

Bellerez told Hampton how there are many kids with access to food, either through school or other sources, but a lack of consistent transportation prevented them from regularly accessing those critical resources.

"I instantly saw the opportunity to help provide consistent transportation for those kids, while also providing a productive source of recreation and fun for kids in need. Even though there is a national bike shortage, I was convinced that by repairing and repurposing donated bikes that many households have laying around, we could make a big impact." Hampton said. He saw a chance for the community to step up and help support vulnerable kids.

And so, Kids on Bicycles was established.

What initially began as a chance to give free bikes to a handful of kids, quickly grew as word spread that he was providing refurbished bikes for free, and the num-





ber of eager recipients grew longer and longer.

Hampton quickly saw the need for reliable transportation for lower income students was greater than he realized, and adjusted his scope accordingly.

Now, this local Darnestown boy wants to make sure that every kid in America has access to the reliable transportation that a bike provides.

Molly's 7th Annual ASAP Walk and Roll for a Cure

Hello! My name is Molly Lichtenstein, I am 28 years old and have lived in Darnestown since I have been three years old. I am now a kindergarten teacher for Montgomery County, at Woodfield Elementary School! In previous years, I would have stated that I suffer from Chiari Malformation, Syringomyelia, Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome, and many related disorders. But, I think it is time that I change my tune. But, let me back up a bit!

Chiari Malformation is a serious neurological disorder where the bottom part of the brain, the cerebellum, descends out of the skull and crowds the spinal cord, putting pressure on both the brain and spine, and disrupting the normal flow of cerebrospinal fluid (CSF); also known as Arnold-Chiari, ACM, ACM I, ACM II, CM.

Due to the displacement of the cerebellum and the disruption of spinal fluid flow there is a condition known as Syringomyelia, a serious neurological disorder where a fluid-filled cyst, known as a syrinx, develops inside the spinal cord, stretching the cord and damaging nerve tissue.

When I was sixteen years old I was diagnosed with Chiari Malformation and Syringomyelia after a soccer injury that would not heal. My life as I knew it stopped and I was forced to rethink EVERYTHING about how I lived and what my goals were. But, like I said before I am changing my tune on how I look at things. I GOT to rethink my life. How many people get that opportunity? Not only did I get to rethink things, but I really learned some hard lessons on what is important: FAMILY, Friends, God and Faith are on the top of my list.

My life has been taken and flipped upside down... several different times... but through it all I have learned some very important things!
