President's Corner

Note from the President

If you have lived in Darnestown for a long time, you know there has been a great deal of change. Sometimes it's within our control, but often it's not.

Outside of some enhancements here and there, I'd love to have the character of our town frozen in time. I think most of you feel the same way, which is why you chose to live here. However, that's not possible. As the region around us grows, Darnestown is increasingly a commuter route and gateway for cars and cyclists to and through the Ag Reserve. Speed, volume, and congestion have significantly impacted safety on our old roads and intersections.

This is why the DCA formed the Roads Task Force in 2019 and asked very targeted questions in our town-wide survey in the summer of 2021 to help focus our efforts. Some pertinent results from the 439 respondents:

- On major commuting roads, the top desired future experiences were: Safe (56%), Bike friendly (40%), Walkable (36%), and **Slower** (28%)
- 88% responded that they would like to have bike lanes or shoulders added on major bike routes
- The top intersections for improvements were Rt. 28/Turkey • Foot Rd. (84%), Rt. 28/Jones Ln. (75%), Seneca Rd./River Rd. (74%), and Seneca Rd./Esworthy Rd. (71%),
- Finally, on page 2 is the 'word cloud' for the open-ended • responses for your 'top priority.'

Of course, the DCA does not have the power to directly implement these changes, but we have continued to advocate and meet with the

state and County officials who can, as well as facilitate communication so you can have your voice heard directly. Our advocacy focuses on the what and where it's the how that we leave to the engineering experts and your input to their plans.

Let me be very clear. The DCA will advocate to reduce speed limits and the need for speed-reducing measures but we will not advocate for what those specific measures should be, whether its speed cameras, signage, etc. And we will never get involved in decisions on speed bumps, period. We leave that entirely to a neighborhood to coordinate, vote, and advocate.

The DCA will advocate for intersection improvements but will not push one measure (circles, stop signs, traffic lights) over another. We will rely on the direct feedback of our residents to the County and state proposals. There may be times when the DCA takes a position but only when there is a clear majority based on an informed vote of our members. When the County proposed the circle at Esworthy and Seneca last year, the DCA intentionally did not take a position. We wanted to leave it up to our residents. Many pushed hard to oppose that circle for a variety of reasons and the County decided to abandon the project.

Just this past month, much to dismay of some, several large trees were removed on Seneca Rd. as part of the

development of 3 new homes across from the entrance to Mary of Nazareth. The removal and assessment of those trees was included in the approved plan and helps make way for a 10-foot wide, shared use walk/bike path along the entire 500 feet of frontage along Seneca Rd., with new tree plantings along that path. A few of you might remember how many trees came down directly in the center of town when the Harris Teeter (then Food Lion) was constructed in the mid '90s. I can tell you it was a lot more than 5 and completely changed the landscape of our village center. I was so incensed at the time that I had a letter published in the old Gaithersburg Gazette with my disgust. Can I imagine Darnestown *without* the Harris Teeter now, some 30 years later? No.

So what's my point in all of this? My point is that there will have to be inconveniences and changes in order for Darnestown to address intersection and road safety. Speed cameras will go up and may annoy you, but they lower speed and they make roads safer. Bike lanes will go in and will cosmetically change our town, but they help protect cyclists and pedestrians and reduce stress on drivers. Intersection changes will be made that could increase your drive time and change the landscape but they will help keep us safe. I'm not saying we have to blindly accept these changes. It's okay to push back, as was done on the Esworthy Circle. But, there are times ahead of us where we need to be prepared to compromise in the name of safety.

1700s



Pleasant Hills plantation was the oldest home showcased in the home tour. Built in 1765 by Charles Gassaway and originally encompassed



1700 acres the land later became Spring Meadows and a large part of Darnestown. Today, the property is owned by Steve and Amy Kurtenbach, who operate a flower farm on the property, also named Pleasant Hills Farm.

1800s



The beautiful house that sits overlooking Riffleford Road was the original portion of the John Hanson Gassaway House. This house was built in 1812 and purchased by John Gassaway, a cousin of Charles Gassaway, in 1872, with additions made that year as well as 1894 and 1897. The property is currently owned by John Wagoner and Debra Massaro, who will soon be opening Giving Tree Farm, an event venue on the property.

1900s





This stunningly decorated home, owned by Matthew and Natalie Hanson, was built by the couple in 1997 with Richard Leggin Architects. The couple completed a major renovation and addition in 2008. It is a truly remarkable home!

2000s





This beautiful farm house inspired home was built by Charles and Robin Hanley in 2000. The Metzger family became the proud owners of this impressive home in 2020. The architectural details make it seem much older than it is.

Programs Chair, Mary Rill, and Assistant Chair, Pam Baer, presented an overview of the upcoming year's activities, which include presentations on ways to add fall color and winter interest to your lawn and garden by local garden expert Kathy



Jentz, an inside look at floral design at a historic property by Ami Wilbur, Floral and Event Décor Designer at Hillwood Estate Museum and Gardens, and a lecture and presentation on garden roses by member Lisa Ruf, an Alexandra Farms Certified Rose Designer. In

addition, hands-on demonstrations are planned for the November and February meetings, and in December, Garden Club member volunteers will share their family customs and traditions in a How do You Holiday? presentation. For our service project in April, club members will once again create bedside bouquets for local assisted living centers, and our year will end in May with a garden tour and luncheon at Oatlands Plantation and Gardens. Following our breakfast and sign-up activities, our hosts, Chief and Mary Markhoff of Calleva Farms, shared their plans for converting the Haunted Forest into a Christmas village and trail walk for five evenings between November 30th and December 8th. In addition to the trail walk, which includeded scenes from favorite Christmas stories. Christmas at Calleva Farm included Christmas tree sales, a Christmas market, and holiday treats. Following the meeting, there was a raffle for all present, and members were given a tour of the farm.

At our October 10th meeting, held at Bretton Woods Recreation Club, Kathy Jentz, author of two books, *Groundcover Revolution* and *The Urban Garden*, as well as editor of *Washington Gardener* magazine, president of the Silver Spring Garden Club, and host of the DC Garden podcast was back by popular demand to share ideas for creating fall color and winter interest with garden plants. She shared ideas for planting fall-blooming bulbs (autumn crocus and daffodil), and

replanting existing pots with fall bloomers, including snap dragons, allyssum, bacopa, pansies, and kale, many of which may continue to bloom into the

spring. She also covered a wide variety of fall-blooming perennials, including asters, turtlehead, heuchera, goldenrods, sedum, and salvia, and recommended numerous shrubs (ansonia blue star, sweet spire, beautyberry, fothergilla, and witch hazels), trees (gingko, persimmon, Japanese maples, and dogwoods), and even grasses, such as muhly grass, to provide fall color. Kathy also promoted leaving seed heads and standing foliage into the late fall to support wildlife, noting that brown and black are colors too!

For our November meeting, the club met at Bretton woods for a hands-on activity creating a tripod floral armature with foraged sticks and beautiful fall flowers.

The Darne Bloomers Garden Club meets the second Thursday of every month from September through May, typically at Bretton Woods Recreation Club. RULER is a systematic, evidence-based approach to social and emotional learning that was developed at the Yale Center for Emotional Intelligence. Using a community-based (village) approach, it teaches students how to:

- Recognize emotions in oneself and in others.
- Understand the causes and consequences of emotions.
- Label emotions with a nuanced vocabulary.

- Express emotions in accordance with cultural norms and social context.
- Regulate emotions with helpful strategies.

These skills are intricately related to adaptive functioning as well as learning!
