# **President's Corner**



Solar Farms in Darnestown?

The short answer is yes. A 3.2-acre solar farm is currently under construction on a 10-acre rural residential property within a

subdivision off River Rd. in Darnestown. This project, called 'Project Santa Rosa,' is being built by Chaberton Energy. Chaberton has also just proposed a much larger solar farm, 'Project Victoria,' for 25 acres of solar on an abutting 42-acre rural residential lot that directly fronts River Rd. The diagram on page 2 shows the approximate locations.

Now, for as long as I can remember, the biggest development concerns to our residents have been around high-density housing and land uses that didn't conform to county standards. Solar has never been in that discussion before and the dynamics around it are a little different.

First, solar—is good, right? Who can possibly be against increasing production of solar power? It's green, it's renewable, it's the direction we need to go as humans on Earth. I just put solar panels on my roof last year. But what if it's big, you see it out your window or drive by it every day, and what was once a field of natural green is now a sheet of black. And what if it was literally in your back yard?

Montgomery County provides for a 'limited use' of solar on certain residential property types, many of which apply to residential properties across Darnestown. 'Limited use' means it's allowed on certain residential properties but implementation is limited. For solar, the property has to be a minimum of 3 acres, the farm can't *Continued on page 2*

produce more than 2.0 megawatts (MW) of electricity, and there's a bunch of other environmental and implementation restrictions and safeguards.

However, regardless of the County's 'limited use' policy or the review and recommendations of the Montgomery County Planning Board, the final approval is in the hands of the state, specifically the Maryland Public Service Commission (MPSC). Recent legislation from the state that will take effect this summer is intended to streamline the approval process for solar farms, shifting authority from local to state government.

The proposed, larger 25-acre solar farm 'Victoria' will produce 4.25 MW of electricity, more than twice what the County permits for that property. The applicant has petitioned MPSC stating "the Applicant is following all the zoning codes required by Montgomery County with the exception of the proposed system size of 4.25 MW, which is not allowed in the RC zone ... The Applicant respectfully asks the Commission to use its wellestablished authority to issue a CPCN [Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity] for the Project and preempt Montgomery County's zoning regulations that conflict with the State's strong policies encouraging community solar development." It may sound like I'm taking a strong position against solar farms in Darnestown. I'm not—my intent is to only provide the limited facts that I know and begin the discussion on this because I am confident this isn't the last time a solar farm will be proposed somewhere in Darnestown. The Darnestown Civic Association has not taken a position and won't until we get more public input and discussion. However, while we all support increasing solar power production, I am concerned about the implementation of solar farms (where, how, and how big) as it directly impacts our residents and the rural residential character of our town.

In our Town Hall meeting in July, we will have a panel of County and State representatives join to help educate us on the policies, processes, and potential impacts of solar farms, including environmental and health impacts. We will not focus specifically on the merits of these two solar farms on River Rd., but they will serve as solid reference points as we learn and ask questions. More details on the Town Hall will be posted on our website and emailed. We hope you can join us to learn more. If you are not able to attend, we will also provide a link online to the recorded meeting. ## **School Boundary Study**

In early June, Montgomery County Public Schools released their initial boundary study options for the opening of Crown High School and the expansion of Damascus High School. The initial study indicates that no changes are expected to elementary school assignments, but middle and high school feeders could shift—so it's important to stay informed! To keep the community informed, The DCA is providing an FAQ overview below.

### Why is there a boundary study?

To support the opening of the new Crown High School (near Crown/Rio) and expansion of Damascus High School.

### How could this effect Darnestown kids?

It could alter their assigned middle school (currently Lakelands MS) and high school (currently Northwest HS).

### When will this take place?

Any changes will take effect in the fall of 2027, when Crown High School is set to open. According to the facts section of the boundary survey website, "the superintendent of schools supports that the new boundaries be implemented beginning with grades 9 and 10 in the 2027-28 school year and that rising grade 11 and 12 students remain at their current high school of attendance."

### How are the decisions being made?

Over the course of the next year, there will be public hearings, surveys, and opportunity for public input, as well as revisions of the initial plans that were shared in June.

- Ultimately, final plans will be approved by the Montgomery County Board of Education (targeted for fall '26)
- The four main factors that are being considered in this boundary change decisions are:
  - Demographic characteristics of student population
  - Geography

- Stability of school assignments over time
  Facility utilization

### Is there opportunity for public input?

Yes, there will be plenty of opportunity for survey-based, written, and public hearings to express your opinion. The Initial Options Feedbak Survey can be found at the link below or by scanning the QR code here.

### What is the DCA's role in this?

- Our primary role is to communicate information and make sure parents have an opportunity to review all of the information and express their concerns and opinions so they are heard directly by the School Board, who is making the ultimate decisions.
- The DCA will discuss and ask for community input at the July town hall meeting and will conduct our own surveys of residents to get input on several factors.
- The DCA was actively involved in the Boundary Study when Seneca Valley was rebuilt (though ultimately Darnestown kids were not impacted). In that study the DCA did take a formal position, but only after overwhelming consensus by the community. We don't know yet if the DCA will take a position on this. The DCA will only take a position and advocate for specific plans and assignments based on a formal consensus of our members.

Pat Tozzi, or Coach Pat as he likes to be called, has been the Head Coach for the Darnestown Swim and Racquet Club since 2013. An exceptional coach and mentor, he has coached close to 1,200 swimmers at more than 180 different summer swim meets during his time as the Head Coach of Darnestown.

Coach Pat has a passion for teaching swimming skills. Whatever time of day you go to the Darnestown pool during the summer swim season, you stand a good chance of finding him on the pool deck or in the water. It is obvious that he loves to teach and that he cares about each swimmer and each swimmer knows that he cares about them.

### **Darne Bloomers Garden Club**

In February, the Darne Bloomers met at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints in the Kentlands, where Alexa Franklin of Potomac Garden Center gave a presentation on styling with house plants, including the benefits of having plants in the home (including improved air quality), and tips for improved growing (including using good peat soil). They brought many beautiful house plants to show the group as they spoke. After the presentation, members created kokedama arrangements using a variety of plants including ferns, cyclamen, orchids, flowering kalanchoe, and smaller terrarium-sized plants. To make the kokedama balls,

the soil was removed from the plant roots, with sphagnum moss added to the roots for the orchids. Next, a container of good quality soil was moistened in a bowl and formed into a  $\sim$ 6-8" ball depending on the

size of the plants selected. The ball was split open and re-formed around the plant roots, then wrapped in a sheet of live moss that was secured by wrapping with fishing line and finished with a few turns of decorative jute or ribbon. The arrangements need to be kept moist but have lasted for months.

For the March meeting at Bretton Woods, Rosarian Jon Gazarek of the Potomac Rose Society provided a comprehensive presentation on all things roses. Jon travels the world for roses and assists in bringing new roses to market. Jon shared his love of roses, his extensive knowledge of current trends (more focus on fragrance) and happenings in the rose industry, and his travels to famous rose farms and growers throughout the world. His enthusiasm for his subject matter was inspiring. and his slides were spectacular. John also shared some of his favorite fragrant roses (Perfumed Kiss, Gabriel, and Für Elise), and recommended five disease-resistant roses for the garden: Firefighter; Bliss Parfuma; Boscobel and Gertrude Jekyll (both David Austin roses); and Princes Charlene de Monaco. At the end of his presentation, he accepted questions from the group and recommended a number of his favorite gardens to visit along the East Coast, including the Kathrine Dulin Folger Rose Garden at the Smithsonian.

In April, the Darne Bloomers assembled for our annual service project, creating bedside bouquets for local assisted living centers. These miniature bouquets, arranged in mint julep cups, are a favorite of the group, and this year's "recipe" was a muted combination of one large peach mum, surrounded by delicate spray

## Troop 1094 Conducts Cold Weather Training in Minnesota

This past winter, Troop 1094 of Darnestown sent two full crews to Scouting America's Northern Tier High Adventure Base in Ely, Minnesota to participate in a rugged cold weather high adventure experience. Scouting America has four national level high adventure bases in the United States where Scouts can excel in their outdoor skills while having a bunch of fun. In summer, the Northern Tier High Adventure Base allows Scouts the opportunity to conduct amazing canoeing treks in the boundary waters of Canada and upper Minnesota. In winter, the Northern Tier High Adventure Base allows Scouts the opportunity to participate in amazing cold weather activities during their "Okpik" (means Snowy Owl in the Inuit language) program in which Scouts learn how to thrive in subzero temperatures, travel across frozen wilderness lakes, and construct their own sleeping structures out of snow.

After flying into Minneapolis/St. Paul International Airport, the Troop's two crews then had a 5- hour bus ride north to Ely, which is right next to the Canadian border. Once we arrived at the Northern Tier High Adventure Base, we were busy from the very start. First, we were broken into two separate crews of 8 Scouts and three adults each and then introduced to our "Interpreters" (crew guides). We then conducted detailed planning for our cold-weather activities for the week and then got issued all of our cold weather gear before staying in cabins for the night. The next morning, our cold weather adventures began.

During our time in the wilderness, our two crews had an amazing time. Some of our awesome activities included snow shoeing, cross-country skiing, dog sledding, ice skating, ice fishing, playing broom ball, and curling. Everywhere we went, each crew member had to pull their own sled with all their own gear along with some crew gear. Each night, our crews usually slept in established campsites right next to the edge

of the lake, but one night, our crews actually slept out on the ice in the middle of the lake. That was really cool. None of us had ever done that before. During the trek, we never used tents. Instead, we built windbreak structures while sleeping under the stars. A windbreak structure is made out of snow and has four walls about three feet tall on all sides where the scouts sleep in the middle to keep the wind from hitting them.

While they were there, we all earned several cool awards. One of the awards was the Duty to God Patch. To earn that patch, we had to say the Northern Tier grace before every meal and hold a brief daily devotion. Another award that we earned was the Okpik Winter Trek Patch. To earn that patch, we had to camp out in the wilderness for at least two nights and hike at least seven miles.

I interviewed one of our Star Scouts, Ryan Helgerman, about his experience at Northern Tier, and he said: "The experience was a 10 out of 10 and many memories were made!" Overall, the Scouts and adults that went to the Northern Tier High Adventure Base this
